# Our 85th Exonumia Auction

This is our second consecutive sale without a live component. To our mild surprise, we received zero complains about this and to our greater surprise, we actually had more bidders than we did in our previous sale held live in Baltimore!

This year's auction is notable for the presence of a number of different topical collections. We have specialized offerings of Statue of Liberty Tokens and Medals; an interesting group of Charles Lindbergh medals; a collection of canine medals; a large offering of medals related to the medical arts and a small but powerful group of early American material.

Almost a third of our sale is devoted to a select group of mostly slabbed So-Called Dollars from the Donald Ensley Collection. There are almost 500 lots in this consignment, so specialists in this area are virtually certain to find many pieces of interest.

We again welcome a consignment from the Tony J. Lopez collection of early American medals. Particularly interesting in this offering are the following: (A) A Wedgwood & Bentley blue jasperware cameo portrait medallion of Benjamin Franklin, (1775) (B) The rarest of all Franklin Nini medallions: A Benjamin Franklin with spectacles and FRANKLIN AMERICAIN legend terra cotta medallion by Nini, 1777. (Storelli 63); (C) A Benjamin Franklin large format bare-headed terra cotta medallion. (Storelli 68) and a Benjamin Franklin "Docteur Franklin" excessively rare large silver plated medallion.

A Presidential Sale would not be a Presidential Sale with a fine offering of Presidential tokens and medals! Our #85 is no exception. Collectors will vie for period drawer pulls for both George Washington and Thomas Jefferson; an excessively rare token of Martin Van Buren, "The Country Demands his Re-election" (MVB 1840-5); a Polk and Dallas double portrait token (JP 1844-3) as well as a rare Polk shell token (JP 1844-7). The selection of Lincoln items is headlined by the popular large Lincoln-Johnson jugate token (AL 1864-1) and a Brenner plaque on Marble. Other 19th century tokens, some scarce and many rare, will tempt our political collectors. The star of our 20th century offering is a 13" cast bronze Presidential Seal wall plaque that once was hung at Camp David and which was presented by President Reagan as a gift to Jack Kemp. The presentation letter from Reagan to Kemp is part of this intriguing lot.

Also offered is one of the largest collections of medical medals to reach the auction block in recent memory. Each medal is described in detail with explanatory text where warranted. Many of these are award medals which, by their nature, are not produced in large quantity and, when presented, are closely held by the recipent and his family.

Our sale would not be complete without a stellar offering of Official Inaugural Medals. This sale is no exception. Offered here is a 1905 Theodore Roosevelt medal by Augustus Saint Gaudens; a rare example of the finished variety of the 1917 Woodrow Wilson medal; the charm from the Calvin Coolidge badge and a choice condition 1937 Official Inaugural License Plate.

Our offering of US Mint Medals includes a number of seldom-seen pieces such as a choice condition Grover Cleveland oval Indian Peace Medals; the elusive Zachary Taylor "Pelican" Medal and an excessively rare and unlisted Washington and Lee University gold orator's medal presented to future United States senator, Miles Poindexter!

Tokens and medals relating to the Statue of Liberty are represented by 32 lots from the duplicate collection of Paul Lajoie who has been the pre-eminent collector of Statue of Liberty material for many years, Out offering of specialized collections is rounded out with a small group of canine medals headed by Karl Goetz's 1914 medal commemorating the first use of Red Cross dogs in time of war (Kienast 148.).

If there is one area for which Presidential has come to be known, it is our offering of art medals by renowned sculptors and medallists. Our selection of 88 medals from the Society of Medalists represents the work of many of the 20th century's finest American medalists. In addition, the following sculptors are represented by at least one, and sometimes, by numerous works:

- **2. LOW 69. NOT ONE CENT. HT 58.** R1. 28.2mm. Copper. NGC MS-62. BN. A nice specimen combining the obverse of Low 67 with the reverse of Low 33. (F)



- 3. LOW 155. T.D. SEAMAN, BELLEVILLE, NJ. HT 204B.
  R5. 27.6mm. Copper. Extremely Fine. The steer used on this token is the same as that used on Low 66 and Low 151.
  From our 1985 Auction #38, lot 14 (with lot envelope) and prior to that from the Roper and Harte Collections.

- **LOW 155. ANOTHER OF THE SAME,** Equal to the above but with a very tiny obverse rim dent at 5:00. (H)



- 5. LOW 180. BERGEN IRON WORKS, LAKEWOOD, NJ. HT 205A. R4. 21.2mm. 3.7 grams. Copper. Choice About Uncirculated. Softly struck at the centers on both sides as always. This token is struck from the same dies as the more common Low 142, but in copper. (H)
- 6. LOW 190. SMALL TEMPLE OF LIBERTY TOKEN. HT
  78. MVB 1836-4. 25.8mm. 6.7 grams. Brass. VF, with a small old dig on the reverse. Holed at top as usual. Obverse with a bust of Van Buren to the right surrounded by his name and a circle of 26 stars. The reverse legend: DEMOCRACY AND OUR COUNTRY is around a Temple of Liberty surmounted by an eagle with scales. In the foreground are agricultural implements and three barrels. A sailing ship is in the distance to the left. (F)
- 7. LOW 192. HENRY CLAY AND THE AMERICAN SYSTEM. HT 79 HC 1840-1. 27.2mm. Copper. I.B. Gardner, Sc. XF/AU. Obverse with a togated bust of Clay to the right and the surrounding legend: HENRY. CLAY. AND THE AMERICAN SYSTEM. On the reverse, an open laurel wreath surrounds UNITED/ WE/ STAND. The "E" of "WE" which is usually only faintly visible is very strongly struck on this token. (F-G)

MD. Miller MD 30; Schenkman 60 C86. 16mm, German Silver. F/VF with fields consistent with this worn grade. Obverse; JOHN L. CHAPMAN BALTIMORE around MINERAL/WATER. Reverse: JOHN L. CHAPMAN APOTHECARY around MEDICINES/AND/PERFUMERY.

Rulau lists three of Chapman's tiny German Silver tokens as belonging to the Hard Times period. He further notes that "There are two other tokens and Chapman (Miller MD. 30 & 31) which probably are later than the Hard Times Period." However, he cites no reason for this opinion and even neglects to list these two tokens in his 1845-60 Section. While we can't disagree with Rulau's reasoning (because there is none!) our inclination is to believe that if his three listed german silver tokens properly belong in the Hard Times period, then this one does too! (\$750+)

  NGC slab states, "HT-319 THIN PLAN. PLAIN" however HT
  319 has a milled edge and this piece does not. Only the second
  example of which we are aware, The AU Dice/Hicks specimen
  (Ex-Chester Krause Collection) was sold by Stacks in 2008 for
  \$460.00. (H)
- 10. LOW 291. FOBES & BARLOW, NEW HAVEN, CT. HT 102. 28.4mm. Copper. NGC AU 58 BN. (F)
- 11. LOW 314. FARNSWORTH, PHIPPS & CO., BOSTON. HT 162. R3. NGC AU 50 BN. (F)



12. LOW 327. WILLIAM RUTTER, BOSTON, MA; HT 170. R7. 30.5mm. Copper. Very Fine with some field marks consistent with the grade. The inscriptions are all visible to the eye for this usually weakly struck piece.

Rutter was a man who seems to have had his finger in many pies. His card mentions such varied disciplines as junk iron and "songs and ballads." A pair of crossed musical instrument, a flute and a horn, are shown on the obverse. According to Storer. "Only 20 were struck and their use was prohibited after they had been in use for only an hour." He considered it, "one of the rarest Massachusetts store cards." (H-I)

No prior lot envelope, but recently purchased from the Steve Tanenbaum Collection and before that, mostly probably from our 1995 Sale Fifty Eight, #66, where it realized \$429.00.
- 14. HT 580A. CHAMBERLAIN WOODRUFF & SCRANTON/ HOTCHKISS HALL & PLATT, FAIR HAVEN. NGC AU 58. (XF) As we have previously suggested, this token was struck by Scovill during the Hard Times Period. Wesley Cox's research has established that Scovill struck and delivered these tokens in 1836. (G)

16. GROVE RANCH PLANTATION, 1886. Medcalf TE-16. 21mm. Copper. F/VF with some dark encrustation on the reverse. Softly struck on 6 in the date and the middle star on the obverse as usually found. Medcalf states that the Grove Ranch Plantation "covered 3,870 acres. In 1885 the plantation employed 110 men and produced 1,300 tons of sugar. 110 yoke oxen were used to provide the work power." Listed on page 414 of the 2015 *Guide Book*.

A rare token as evidenced by the \$10,575 obtained at auction by Heritage on 8/14 for a PCGS AU-58 (overgraded!) example and a similar piece (Graded AU by PCGS) by Stacks/Bowers for \$8812.00 in 2012. (\$4000-6000)

17. CHAS. P. KELLOGG & CO./ ED. L. HUNTLEY, CHICAGO. Schenkman 225K6. 34mm. Black Hard Rubber. Unc. Since the Huntley reverse also appears on the tokens of another Chicago clothing house, the assumption is that the card was commissioned by Huntley rather than by his employer. (F)

Obverse: OLDER'S MUSEUM CIRCUS & MENAGERIE \* COMING\* around a lion facing right. Mirror reverse. We sold a similar inferior specimen in our 2009 Auction Seventy Nine for \$310.50.

The Bowers reference is to recently issued *Token and Medal Society Guide to U.S. Shell Cards 1867-1880* by Q. David Bowers. This is a lavishly presented comprehensive treatment of a long neglected series. Everything that David authors is worthy of study, but he has outdone himself with this beautifully presented and informative volume. (H)

19. M.B. CYPERS C/S from a prepared punch on the obverse of a VG 1853 large cent Unlisted by both Brunk and Rulau on this host coin. Type of Brunk C-1198; Rulau ME-Sk 1. Cypers was a gunsmith in Skowhegan, Maine 1859-1868. (F-G)

Geekie was in the wholesale & retail liquor beginning in 1860 at this 123 Baltimore Street address. He moved from Baltimore in 1876. Ladies Blush was a specialty drink using crème de noyaux. The reverse is referred to in Storer's *Medicina in Numis* in the section devoted to "Patent Medicine – Pharmaceutical Products" and so apparently Ladies Blush had some claims to having medicinal properties. Dr. Storer also described it in his pamphlet *The Medals Jeton and Tokens Illustrative of Obstetrics and Gynaecology* 1857 p 9 No 37.

This is a key Baltimore token and the only one of which we are aware. We first sold it in our December 2004 Auction, (#134) for \$506.00, just slightly more than its catalog value in VF. It was more recently consigned to one of the large auction houses where it went unappreciated when it was offered without comment as to its great rarity. We note the auction sale of MdBa 36a, the 5¢ denomination of this merchant by Heritage on 9/17/08 for \$690.00. (H)

**21. H. COLMAN** c/s from a prepared punch on the reverse of a VG 1827 large cent. Brunk C-749. Identified by Brunk as a Boston gunsmith and locksmith in the 1847-1860 period. (F)

22. RARE AND UNLISTED VARIETY OF THE ST. LOUIS POST OFFICE TOKEN, CA 1850'S. MO 32 var. 24.2mm. White Metal. Lustrous XF/AU, with graffiti, as noted below. Obverse with a displayed eagle perched atop a shield superimposed over three crossed flags to either side. Inscribed above is ST. LOUIS POST OFFICE. The reverse die is signed at bottom in small letters by J.M. KERSHAW, a well-known St. Louis engraver and copperplate printer. At center, in large script letters is hand engraved the name, JULIUS HUTAWA. Both above and below this name is some graffiti consisting of miscellaneous letters.

Rulau notes, "The St. Louis Post Office checks were likely box holder identification discs or served some similar function. Probably each engraved specimen is unique. Undoubtedly there are others that have survived. "Julius Hutawa, among the early German immigrants to Saint Louis, Missouri, arrived with the Berlin Society in 1833 with his brother Edward. The brothers engaged in lithography and publishing and were well-known for their maps of the area. (G-H)

24. H. M. ALBEE counterstamped from a prepared punch on both sides of a F/VF 1865 two cent piece. This token is very likely that of H. M. Albee of Newark, NJ, a manufacturer of wood working machines. Honestus Morton Albee received some important patents for carving and routing machines. Starting in about 1876 he started to manufacture them himself on a small scale. In 1891 he partnered with W. H. Purdy of New York, and the following year the two of them created Albee Machine Co., operating out of Purdy's premises. (F)

Rx: GOOD FOR ONE CHANCE/ IN/ RAFFLE/ FOR/ NUMISMATIC/ BOOKS./ AT/ A.B. SAGE & CO./ N.Y./ NOV. 1859. The obverse die was also used on Civil War tokens. It is Fuld Patriotic die #113. (F)

48. MAJOR ANDERSON TRIBUTE MEDAL, 1861. 70mm. Copper. George H. Lovett, Sc. XF with scattered field marks consistent with the grade and occasional areas of corrosion. Obverse scene of Fort Sumter burning in the midst of battle. SUMTER, above; APRIL 12 & 13/1861 in exergue. Reverse: Wreath with US shield at bottom encloses a Latin legend. A circle of 35 stars surrounds the further inscription: TO/ MAJ. ROBERT ANDERSON/ U.S.A./ FROM THE CITIZENS OF/ NEW YORK CITY/ AS A / SLIGHT TRIBUTE/ TO HIS/ PATRIOTISM.

Several weeks after the fall of Fort Sumter, George Lovett executed this medal and enlisted Augustus B. Sage to help sell them. It is very possibly the first Civil War medal ever made. Copper medals were struck and presented to those who helped pay for the gold medal which was presented to Major Anderson. Bowers calls copper examples "very rare." This medal was voted #100 in Jaeger and Bower's "100 Greatest American Medals and Tokens" (G-H)

The reverse inscription is in seven lines: TO/ GEN. H.M. NAGLEE/ A TOKEN/ OF/ ADMIRATION/ AND RESPECT/ FOR HIS/ GALLANT SERVICES. The legend around reads: THE PENINSULA \* CHICAHOMINY \* THE CAROLINAS.

General Henry Morris Naglee (1815-1866) commanded Brigades 1 & 2 of the IV Corps in the 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Division, Army of the Potomac. He was wounded in a bayonet attack at Fair Oaks. Prior to the Civil War, Naglee was in the banking business in San Francisco, California, operating under the name of Naglee & Co. His firm made gold ingots, one of which, the unique \$100 bar, survives today.

It is not known for certain who caused this medal to be struck. Presumably, it was a private effort by member's of Naglee's Brigade. Curiously, a French medalist and the Paris Mint was chosen to do the work. Perhaps there was some connection between this medal and Tennessee's medal to General George Thomas, which also used a French medalist (Alfred Borrel) and was struck at the Paris Mint (using Tiffany dies). (G)

Rx: THE REBEL STEAMER/ MERRIMAC./ WITH/ 2 GUNS./ DEFEATED BY THE/ UNION STEAMER/ MONITOR/ WE/ 2 GUNS./ IN HAMPTON RDS. MAR.9, 1862.

Schenkman notes that examples of this piece appeared in a Woodward Sale in October of 1864 proving that they were struck prior to the end of the Civil War. He rates silver specimens as "very rare." (H)

The inscription here appears to be taken from William H. Seward's speech in 1863 at the dedication of the Gettysburg Battlefield. He said in part:

I thank my God for the hope that this is the last fratricidal war which will fall upon the country which is vouchsafed to us by Heaven,—the richest, the broadest, the most beautiful, the most magnificent, and capable of a great destiny, that has ever been given to any part of the human race. And I thank him for the hope that when that cause is removed, simply by the operation of abolishing it, as the origin and agent of the treason that is without justification and without parallel, we shall thenceforth be united, be only one country, having only one hope, one ambition, and one destiny.

Exactly when and why this intriguing piece was made is uncertain. We suspect that it is postwar and perhaps associated with a Union veterans gathering. (F-G)





59. WAR FUND COMMITTEE OF BROOKLYN VETERAN'S MEDAL, 1863. 40.9mm. White Metal. F. B. Smith, Sc. Proof-like About Uncirculated. Three tiny obverse edge cuts at 12:00, 5:00 and 7:00 probably are nail marks caused by an inept museum curator. Obverse: HONOR TO THE BRAVE ILLUSTRIOUS DEEDS A NATION'S PRIDE around an eagle with wings spread perched on a U.S. shield around which a snake is entwined. Reverse: FROM THE WAR FUND COMMITTEE OF BROOKLYN NEW-YORK 1863 around a wreath which encloses an open center portion for engraving the recipient's name. This example is not inscribed.

Medals, such as this, were presented in silver to soldiers in regiments composed wholly or in part of Kings County men, who distinguished themselves by some eminent service or act of bravery in the Civil War. We have never seen in awarded example in any metal. (F-G)

Ericsson, the brilliant Swedish inventor, was the designer of the Union ironclad warship, Monitor. The medal is housed in its well-worn original brown leather box gilt stamped on top: MINNESMEDALJ/ OFVER/ JOHN ERICSSON/ 1890. A similar piece brought \$241.50 in our 2012 Auction 82. #67.

In 1861 the Confederate salvaged the USS Merrimac from the depths of water at the Norfolk Naval Yard where it had been scuttled by the Union. Raising, cleaning and reworking resulted in the birth of the CSS Virginia the Confederate's ironclad ship. Tredegar Iron Works of Richmond VA was contracted to supply the iron plating. The horseshow

is attached to a card which reads, in part, "This little horseshoe was made from a part of the armor of the Confederate ironclad VIRGINIA (formerly the United States frigate MERRIMAC) The armor plates for the VIRGINIA (MERRIMAC) were made at the Tredgar Iron Works, Richmond, Virginia. The card goes on to give a more detailed history of the ship. (G)

Most of the pieces in this offering have been slabbed and professionally graded by Michigan Masters Numismatic Service (MMNS). Each slab pedigrees the piece as being from the "D. Ensley Collection." Since the time this collection was slabbed and graded, MMNS has moved its location to Florida and changed its name to "Masters Grading Service" (MMS)



In our opinion, the grading standards used by MMNS are at least equal to that of NGC. We will, however, continue to view such grading with our own eyes and standards and where we differ, we will note our grade or qualification immediately following the MMNS grade.

GEORGE WASHINGTON SET OF FEDERAL ERA TWO 205. **DRAWER PULLS (1795-1810).** 48 mm (diam.) x 38 mm (D), base plate 55 mm (dia). Brass. Comes with mounting plates (4 pieces total). This set of two drawer pulls bears the familiar Houdon bust of Washington seen on the Washington before Boston medal, and are of similar shape and construction as the Jefferson cabinet knob, but slightly smaller in size. These could have been used as drawer pulls or cabinet knobs. Extensively hand finished including lined and curved stippling work surrounding the portrait and the scalloped framing on the knob and mounting plate. Under close examination the name WASHINGTON appears below the bust of Washington, but has been partially obscured by the finish work. These were also likely produced by Marchant and Pingo in their commercial venture producing this brass furniture hardware with busts of historic figures. In excellent condition with one area of verdigris on one of the Excessively rare and desirable, the Ed Gillette collection had only a single example of this Washington drawer pull (and a second pull of lesser value with a heraldic eagle design) which realized \$1960.00 in a March 1, 2008 Heritage Auction (Lot 48010). \$1500+

Missing the original bail handles, but could easily be replaced with modern handles. Unmarked, but this type of patriotic drawer hardware was manufactured by Hands & Jenkins in England from 1791-1805; these could be of later 19th century manufacture. (G)
- **207. GENERAL WASHINGTON OVAL BRASS DRAWER PULL.** 2.75 x 3.25" XF. Missing the half-circle brass handle but with the original brass screws for securing to the wooden drawer face panel. The pull features a relief likeness of George Washington in his military general's uniform, flanked by the vertical inscription GENERAL WASHINGTON to either side. Also thought to have been produced in England for export to the American market and date from the first





quarter of the 19<sup>th</sup> century. (G)

### **DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE MEDAL.** Baker 53F var. 89mm. Copper electrotype. Charles Cushing Wright, Sc. XF. With visible wear on the high points of the hair and the truncation of the bust. There are some light abrasions in the field in front of the bust. Obverse with a high relief Houdon

style bust of Washington to the left in a plain field. The reverse presents a copy of John Trumbull's famous painting of the report on Independence of the Committee of Five to the Continental Congress, led by Franklin and Jefferson.

This medal differs from Baker 53F in that it does not have GEORGE WASHINGTON inscribed in two vertical lines to either side of the bust The struck medal of this type is among the rarest of Washington medals. Most, like this piece, are museum quality electrotypes by G. Segabaden, made in the mid 19th century. This example, without the GEORGE WASHINGTON name is one of only two known to us. We sold the discovery example (AU) in our 2006 Auction Seventy-Five for \$747.50. (H-I)

Obverse with Roman mantled bust of Washington to left surrounded by the legend, WASHINGTON ASSOCIATION OF NEW JERSEY. The reverse depicts the large home which served as Washington's headquarters, with MORRISTOWN above and 1779 1780 below.

The central obverse and reverse devices are within a raised oval on a rectangular background and are a single entity rather than two attached pieces as described in Rulau/Fuld. The medal is looped at the top. (F-G)

This replica in relief is very different from the incuse hand engraved original, but forms an interesting footnote to the series. An AU example in our 2012 Auction Eighty Two brought \$603.75.
- 212. DETROIT COIN CLUB 200<sup>TH</sup> MEETING, 1932. Baker 945; Hansen 59. R8. 51.1mm. Bronze. Unsigned. (Aug. Frank, Phila.) Uncirculated. Obv: GEORGE WASHINGTON FIRST PRESIDENT 1789-1797 around naked bust left. Rx: Laurel wreath to left of 5 line inscription: COMMEMORATING/ 200<sup>TH</sup> MEEETING/ DETROIT COIN CLUB/ SEPTEMBER 15<sup>TH</sup>/ 1932. Only 28 medals are said to have been struck in bronze and 8 in silver.

At one time we had a very large collection of 1932 tokens and medals which served as the basis for our article in the Numismatist revising the prior 1932 catalog listings. This was

THOMAS JEFFERSON PRESIDENTIAL PORTRAIT 214. BRASS CABINET DOOR PULL, (1795-1810). 57 mm (diam.) x 38 mm (D), base plate 50 mm (diam.). Brass. VF/ XF. Excessively rare and possibly unique circa 1800 Jefferson portrait cabinet door knob or drawer pull and mounting plate (2 pieces). This is a high quality custom piece which is extensively hand-finished by the artisan including stippling work surrounding the portrait and the scalloped framing on the knob and mounting plate. Unsigned, but the portrait matches those made and signed by Pingo & Nathaniel Marchant at the turn of the 18th century. (Note that there are what appear to be markings at 3:00 inside the scalloped border which could be M & P.) There are examples of rare drawer pulls with this same bust signed by Marchant and Pingo at both the Winterthur Museum and New York Historical Society, but those examples have handles which are flat disks. This example with the more substantive handle was likely intended as a cabinet door pull or even a door knob.

According to Donald L. Fennimore in *Metalwork in Early America* Pingo and Marchant made dies of Jefferson based upon an 1804 Jefferson portrait by Saint-Mémin, and used them to create "cloak pins, mirror knobs, chimney hooks curtains, cabinet handles, and box lids", confirmed, according to a footnote, by an advertisement in *Holden's Triennial Directory* for the years 1809, 1810 and 1811. There is an important hole

in Fennimore's conclusion; the Marchant and Pingo Jefferson bust does not resemble the Saint-Mémin portrait. No other period image that we can find matches this profile portrait, so it is likely that Marchant executed it independently based upon period imagery. In 1797 Marchant was appointed as Deputy to Lewis Pingo, then Chief Engraver at the Royal Mint. Marchant and Pingo had a long association so it is possible that this is a late 18<sup>th</sup> century creation and the private venture in producing these brass portrait pieces preceded their official association at the mint. Still, there is no question that Pingo and Marchant made these from the matching portraits with the Winterthur and NYHS examples. Early manufactured Jefferson portrait items prior to or contemporary to his presidency are extremely rare and much sought after. \$1750+

### MARTIN VAN BUREN

**216. "INAUGURAL TOKEN."** MVB 1840-1. 37mm. Unsigned, but ascribed by McSorley to Joseph F. Thomas. Very Fine,

but with two new 17mm vertical scratches in the right obverse field. Holed for suspension, as issued. Obverse bust left of Van Buren. MARTIN VAN BUREN & DEMOCRACY around. The reverse depicts a flying eagle with scales in its beak, balanced in favor of DEMOCRACY over FEDERALISM. The date, MARCH 4./ 1841, is placed immediately below the eagle.

Van Buren was, of course, not inaugurated President on March 4, 1841 - that honor fell to the winner of the election, William Henry Harrison. This token was struck in anticipation of that event and illustrates the difficulty in assigning a particular token which recites the inaugural date to the campaign or the inauguration. (F)

The reverse depicts an eagle with upraised wings perched on a small safe surrounded by the legend: (VAN BUREN) THE COUNTRY DEMANDS HIS RE-ELECTION.

There is a similarity of the eagle on the reverse to that which appears on the tokens issued by Dr. Lewis Feuchtwanger. McSorley believes that Smith also executed these numismatic classics. This piece is probably the rarest of the 1840 Van Buren tokens. It is considerably rarer than MVB 1840-7 (Low 57), highly prized by Hard Times Token collectors. Woodward termed it an "extreme rarity" and Satterlee stated that it was "excessively rare" and "only several struck". (\$1000+)

- **219, VOTE THE LAND FREE.** MVB 1848-3. A bold c/s on a VG 1840 U.S. large cent . VOTE THE LAND/ FREE has traditionally been described as the campaign slogan of the Free

Soil Party which opposed the extension of slavery into the new states and territories. However, Bob Merchant's research has recently uncovered the source of this counterstamp and a new meaning to the phrase.

Bob located the octagonal-shaped steel die punch, which reads "Vote the Land Free" at the Kansas Historical Society. The following statement appears at their website, "According to the donor, this stamp was used by the National Reform Party to impress the phrase "Vote the Land Free" on U. S. coins in the 1840s. In 1844, the National Reform Association (NRA) was organized by George Henry Evans in New York City to lobby Congress for free homesteads in the West. By marking coins, the NRA hoped to attract recognition. In 1848, NRA was absorbed into other political movements, like the Free Soil and Abolitionists. The efforts of Evans led to the Homestead Act of 1862." (F)

- 221. HONESTY AND INTEGRITY WILL MEET ITS JUST REWARD. WHH 1840-8. 36.2mm. White Metal. Unsigned, but ascribed by McSorley to Joseph F. Thomas. Very Fine with surfaces consistent with the grade. Holed for suspension, as always. The 2 line obverse legend: MAJ. GEN. W.H. HARRISON/ THE HERO/ OF TIPPECANOE encircles a military bust left of Harrison. On the reverse, HONESTY & INTEGRITY appears above the typical log cabin scene. In exergue; WILL MEET ITS/ JUST REWARD.



Called "Extremely Rare' by Woodward in the McCoy Sale, it was one of the few log cabin pieces missing in the Lynch Collection. The XF McSorley specimen brought \$220.00 in 1998. (G)

Obverse with a long-necked draped bust of Polk to the left, YOUNG HICKORY to either side. The legend around reads: PRESS ONWARD - ENLARGE THE BOUNDARIES OF FREEDOM. The reverse legend: DALLAS & VICTORY. EQUAL PROTECTION TO ALL CLASSES surrounds a clothed bust of Dallas to the left.

The obverse legend refers to the Texas and Oregon question. Part of the Democratic National Convention provided that, "the reoccupation of Oregon and the reannexation of Texas at the greatest practicable period, are great American measures, which this convention recommends to the cordial support of the democracy of the Union". George Bancroft, the Democratic candidate for Governor of Massachusetts, in advocating the acquisition of Texas and Oregon, coined the expression, "extending the areas of freedom". The reverse legend: "equal protection to all classes", was predicated upon Resolution 4 of the Democratic platform which declared in part, "that every citizen has a right to demand and insist upon....complete and ample protection of persons and property". **SCARCE CLOTHING BUTTON** HC 1844-61, 23 mm. Brilliant Unc. The center of this clothing button has a gilt brass insert featuring a bust of Clay on a wavy background, inscribed "Henry Clay 1845." The brass border has a raised floral design. The shank is no longer present on the reverse. (G)

### **ZACHARY TAYLOR**



230. RIO GRANDE TEXAS. ZT 1848-18. 27.3mm. Very Good. Unsigned, but ascribed by McSorley to the Henry Miller firm of Louisville, Ky. Holed for suspension. Obverse with a military bust of Taylor to the right within an open oak wreath surrounded by the legend: GEN. Z: TAYLOR HERO OF PALO ALTO & RESACA DE LA PALMA \*. The reverse legend: RIO GRANDE TEXAS MAY 9 & 10 1846 encloses a displayed eagle encircled by 13 stars.

The two battles mentioned on this token were fought on the banks of the Rio Grande on May 8<sup>th</sup> & 9th, rather than on the 9th & 10th. DeWitt notes that this was "one of the few Taylor

pieces not restruck and has always been referred to as very rare. Only a few copies exist in each metal. Satterlee referred to this piece as "excessively rare." We sold McSorley's AU specimen in 1998 for \$462.00. An MS-65 in the 2013 Ford Sale brought \$2037.50 (G)

### **LEWIS CASS**



231. THE SUBTREASURY AND THE TARIFF OF FORTY SIX. LC 1848-1. 41.3mm. White Metal. Allen Leonard, Sc. Proof-like Uncirculated. Obverse with civilian bust of Cass to the left, GENERAL L. CASS to either side. The reverse bears a rose wreath enclosing the inscription: THE/SUBTREASURY/ & THE TARIFF/ OF FORTY/SIX.

This restrike was made from the original dies some twelve years or so after they were originally issued. The reverse bears a diagnostic crack running through the center inscription which does not appear on originals. 25 restrikes were struck in copper and 2 in silver. An unknown, but very limited number were made in white metal. Considering their age and how rare and expensive originals are, these restrikes seem to us to be a perfectly acceptable addition to one's collection. However, we feel strongly that the difference between the two should always be noted. (G)

This is easily the most popular of the 1864 tokens. It is the largest piece in the series and is the only one portraying both portraits on the same side. An NGC MS-61 example brought \$2165.00 in our 2014 Auction Eighty Four.

This piece is more weakly struck than usual with very little detail on the bust of Lincoln and on the breast and talons of the eagle. Obverse with a bearded bust of Lincoln facing right. \* ABRAHAM LINCOLN \* IN GOD WE TRUST around. "25" below the bust. At the enter of the reverse is a spread eagle, 5 stars to left, 4 to right. FOR EVER above, INSEPERABLE, below. The border legend reads; UNITED STATES OF AMERICA with 2 stars to either side of the date, 1864.

King comments that, "From the general design of this piece, it is thought to have been intended as a pattern for a 25 cent piece, but nothing of its history is known." (G-H)

on an 8 ½ x 11" slab of green marble with a bronze easel affixed to the back of the marble. The marble is in just about perfect condition with only a chip on the back (where it can't be seen when on display.)

This is easily the most popular of Brenner's work as the portrait is intimately associated with that on the Lincoln cent. The plaque itself is a scarce, but not rare, item. However, the presence of the original green marble does make the total package a rare one. Although signed by Klaber, D. Wayne Johnson believes that this plaque was actually produced by the Gorham Company for their client, the S. Klaber Co. The Brenner plaque of Lincoln holds a very special fascination for many collectors. Max Peinlich was an Austrian sculptor who received his training in the Imperial Museum of Arts and Crafts in Vienna and in the Ecole des Beaux Arts in Paris. He came to America and first received recognition at the Saint Louis World's Fair. "where a case of jewels of his design and execution attracted much attention because of the force and originality of the ideas expressed and a certain plastic element in the workmanship that gave almost the effect of sculpture in miniature." His Lincoln portrait is his only medallic work known to us. It is also known in 6" and 4 ¼" sizes. Peinlich's Lincoln relief was copyrighted in 1912 by Newark's Griffoul Foundry. However, the Griffoul foundry signature is unknown on any Lincoln plaque. (H)

One of a group of four similarly styled tokens by True for the 1860 campaign. DeWitt states that original strikings were in White Metal, and those in other metals were restrikes . If so, these restrikes were made very soon after the original strikings, probably at the same time that many of the Clay, Taylor, Scott and Buchanan tokens were restruck (ca. 1860!)

Of course, it is entirely possible that the non-white metal tokens are not restrikes, but are metal varieties struck strictly for collectors and not disseminated during the campaign. DeWitt cites no authority for his conclusion that the Douglas, Bell and Breckinridge non white metal tokens from this group are restrikes. Indeed, in his discussion of AL 1860-18, the Lincoln companion piece, no mention is made at all of the word "restrike." The statement is made, however, that "In view of the metal varieties, undoubtedly some were struck expressly for sale to collectors also." (F-G)

This piece is of particular interest to Civil War token collectors who consider the 4 President House tokens as among the most desirable in the patriotic token series. (H)

This token was issued by Hartford numismatist, Alfred S. Robinson. who was an avid Douglas supporter. While on an extended speaking tour of new England, Douglas first coupled the phrase, "Mind you own business" with his doctrine of "popular sovereignty". The speech was widely reported and well-received. Robinson, who was in the business of issuing tokens on a commercial basis, ordered Lovett to make the dies for this "Little Giant" "MYOB" token. However, the reverse die broke after 24 copies were struck in silver and 21 in copper nickel. (F-G)

A scarce medal with a small bust of Washington that went unnoticed by Baker. In the subsequent Rulau/Fuld update, they refers to a specimen of this type which we ran in our 1997 McSorley Sale, but neither describes nor lists it (even though they report that it brought \$154.00!) We sold an example similar to that offered here in our 2011 Auction Eighty One for \$264.50.

An XF/AU in our 2005 Auction 74. brought \$431.00.



This is one of a small number of different pieces dated 1931 which imitates the satirical Bryan Money of the 1896-1900 campaign period. Since it is dated 1931, it obviously can't be a contemporary piece of Bryan Money and the fact that it is so dated makes it unlikely that it was designed to pass as a genuine period piece. Our instinct is to say that it is somehow related to depression era economic conditions and the fact that 1931 was the year that Great Britain went off the gold standard and there was talk of the US following suit. We have, however, been unable to find any discussion at all concerning these pieces other than a occasional auction listing referring to this piece as a piece of "Bryan Money." Just on general principles, this should be of great interest to collectors of Bryan Money. Someday its true history will be revealed. (G)

The NOPU was initially created to entertain distinguished visitors to New Orleans. By 1913, it had morphed into the NO Chamber of Commerce. In 1905, while New Orleans was suffering an outbreak of Yellow Fever, President Roosevelt visited the city against the advice of his aides, who feared he might fall victim. The visit served the city well as neighboring states were ordering quarantines against New Orleans. His visit helped dispel fears and restore confidence in the city. TR against visited the city during Mardi Gras in March, 1911 and was the guest of honor at a dinner held by the Progressive Union on the 11th. The medal offered here was, no doubt, a

table favor given to those attending the banquet. Rare – the first we have seen. (F-G)

Reverse: K.K.K. REALM OF NEW JERSEY around an open HOLY BIBLE with the initials K.A.P. (Keep America Protestant.) below. To the left of these initials is © A.H. Bell.

Arthur Hornbui Bell (1891 –1973) was an attorney and the Grand Dragon of the Ku Klux Klan in New Jersey. He later became Vice President of the German-American Bund. In 1940 he was investigated by the Dies Committee for plans to merge the KKK and the Nazi movement. Later in life he had changed his outlook and said: "I think tolerance should be taught in the public schools." (F)



Dear Jack. Please accept this gift of the U.S. Presidential Seal wall plaque from Camp David as a sign of appreciation for all your many contributions to this country and the administration. You are indeed an exceptional friend and individual who has made a difference during your life. Again, I hope you enjoy this gift. Take care of yourself - - you know how greatly I count on you and I shall look forward to seeing you again. Sincerely, Ronald Reagan. (We believe this to be an auto-pen signature)

At the time of the gift, Jack Kemp was a Congressman representing Western New York's 31st congressional district (from 1971 to 1989) Subsequently, he served as Secretary of Housing and Urban Development (1989-1993). He was later the Republican Party's nominee for Vice President in the 1996 election, running with Bob Dole.

We have been in business in the Washington, D.C. area for almost 50 years. In this time, we have seen more than our share of Presidential gifts and personalized items. The vast majority of such things are small inexpensive items of jewelry, pens, note pads & golf balls etc. which are distributed in quantity primarily by Presidential aides as opposed to the President himself. This stunning bronze Presidential Seal wall plaque, authenticated in writing to come from Camp David by the President himself, stands almost alone in its importance and extravagance. The letter can be removed from the back of the plaque and could easily be framed so that the two could be seen together. We are often kidded by one of our good friends for our use of the phrase "once in a lifetime opportunity," but folks – this is it! Hard to price – since we can think of no comparable – but we would not be surprised to see it bring \$7500 or higher.

The blank reverse would allow it to be affixed to a larger mount such as a wooden plaque, or it could be engraved and used as an award medal. (F)

- 287. A PIECE OF THE OVAL OFFICE 1934 FLOOR. In a 1991 article in the New Republic by Fred Barnes, the story of this Reagan gift item was told as follows: "John Rogers, a resourceful Reagan aide now nominated to be undersecretary of state for management, found in an attic pieces of the old cork floor from the Oval Office. Some had cleat marks from Dwight Eisenhower's golf shoes (his putting green was just outside the Oval Office). Rogers put them in lucite with the inscription: "This fragment of cork was part of the floor installed in the White House Oval Office in 1934. The floor supported six Presidents of the United States before it was removed in 1969." Reagan gave the floor souvenirs, packaged in a blue jewelry

case with presidential seal, to visitors, Cabinet members, and aides."

We can find only one public offering of this fascinating relic –Ira and Larry Goldberg's Sale #52 in 1909 had an example which brought a strong \$2588.00 result. This strikes us as most generous – but who knows?

refers to Buffalo, NY where the beefy President Cleveland was at one time the mayor. "R.R.R." refers to Blaine's unfortunate utterance of "Rum, Romanism and Rebellion". The face of the harpy on the reverse is meant to be Blaine's. The design has given us a male harpy - Virgil and Hesiod have given us only females. In Greek mythology, Harpies were vultures with the head and breasts of a woman. They were very fierce and loathsome, living in an atmosphere of filth and stench and contaminating everything which they touched! A Proof-like Unc. example brought \$373.75 in our 2003 Auction Eighty Three.

INAUGURATION \* suspends this ribbon. It also suspends a dark blue back ribbon which is almost in complete tatters. It is literally held together by 2 threads and probably will separate in half by the time it arrives at the successful bidder's doorstep. The name of the committee is usually found imprinted at the bottom of this back ribbon. Not so in this instance, either because it has worn away or because the ribbon is a replacement. (H)

The obverse features a youthful stern portrait of TR to the left, his name above and formal title below. In the right field is the Latin, AEQVVM/CVIQUE, an approximation of the Roosevelt campaign slogan of "a square deal". The dominant reverse is an imposing American eagle perched on a rocky crag. The legend above reads: WASHINGTON D.C. MARCH IV MCMV. To either side of the eagle is the motto: E/PLURIBUS UNUM. Saint-Gaudens' eagle is familiar to coin collectors as he used it again, at President Roosevelt's request, on the reverse of his newly designed \$10.00 gold coin.

There are apparently two varieties of this medal – with and without the TIFFANY & CO. edge mark; the plain edge variety being rarer by far. This is only the third of which we are aware. The other two were both auctioned by Stacks-Bowers in their March 2014 sale of the Reinhold R. Giersch Collection. According to the catalog, Mr. Girsch was a foreman at Tiffany & Co, The Giersch Collection contained 28 items, many of them of Tiffany manufacture. The first TR Inaugural medal offered (#90) was described as "Extremely Fine" and with "....every appearance of a medal that was not up to the usual production standards of released, issued specimens." The edge was unfinished and the ...."casting is not as precise as usually seen." It is possible, said the cataloger, that the medal was "a studio second." This medal brought \$12,925.00.

The second medal in the Giersch Collection (Lot #91) was also described as extremely Fine but "Unlike the previous medal, this appears to be a finished example, with the typically well-filed, founded edges that are familiar to the issue. The patina is dark brown with hints of tan here and there." This medal brought \$19,975.00.

The medal offered here is clearly superior in condition to Giersch #91. The patina is a more even dark brown and there is somewhat les wear evident on the high spots. Committee records state that there was a total of 125 medals produced. There is a possibility that both the Giersch medal and this one were not counted in the official mintage. There is a modest reserve of \$16,000 on this lot. (\$20.000+)

292. DAVISON'S OFFICIAL MEDAL, 1905. TR 1905-3; Marqusee 28. 44.2mm. Bronze. Thick (4.5mm. measured at 6:00) Planchet. 51.8 grams. Light brown patina. Unsigned. (Jos. K. Davison's Sons). Uncirculated. A few minor spots. The obverse bears a bust of Roosevelt to the left, his name to either side. The reverse is inscribed: INAUGURATED PRESIDENT/ OF THE/ UNITED STATES/ MARCH 4/ 1905. Spray of oak & olive leaves at bottom. The Davison signature is in tiny letters running along the bottom left border. A total of 3000 medals were struck and distributed to members of the subsidiary committees.


The medal is a reduced version of the 1901 U.S. Mint medal designed by Barber & Morgan, although their names appear nowhere on the medal. Barber's portrait of Roosevelt to the left



is virtually copied completely except that the chain from the President's glasses to his vest was eliminated. Morgan's reverse is also virtually the same, a new inaugural date being the only change. (H-I)

Uncirculated. The obverse bears a bust of Wilson to the left and a legend that reads: INAUGURATION MARCH 4, 1913. The reverse bears an inscription in seven lines: WOODROW/WILSON/ PRESIDENT/ THOMAS/ RILEY/ MARSHALL/VICE PRESIDENT, flanked by fasces to either side, a displayed eagle at top and a floral branch below.

Most of the medals that were struck by Whitehead & Hoag were not signed by the artist. However, a great number of their unsigned medals were the work of just two talented artists, Julio Kilenyi and Jonathan M. Swanson. In the past, we have speculated that the work on this medal was done by one of these two talented sculptors. We recently ran across the following note in the August 1914 Numismatist in which there was a review of recent medals.

"By Mr. Swanson—Plaster medal plaques of President Wilson and of Mr. F. C. Higgins by Mr. Swanson. The last inaugural medal, obv. portrait of President Wilson, rev., name of President Wilson and Vice President Marshall...." (G)

#### **WOODROW WILSON, 1917**

1917 - FINISHED VARIETY. WW 1917-3. 50.7mm. Bronze. Darrell Crain, Sr., Sc. (R. Harris & Co.). About Uncirculated with irregular dark toning. Edge marked: R. HARRIS & CO. The obverse bears a small framed portrait of Wilson to the left flanked by two female figures, one of whom holds a cornucopia. The surrounding legend reads: SECOND INAVGVRATION MARCH 4 1917 The wartime mood was evidenced by the inscription: PREPAREDNESS PROSPERITY under the portrait. The reverse bears a displayed eagle perched atop a shield flanked by fasces. The shield is inscribed in eight lines: WOODROW/WILSON/ PRESIDENT/ THOMAS/ RILEY/ MARSHALL/VICE PRESIDENT/ 1917-1921.

The 1917 medal comes in two distinct varieties, The so-called "Finished" variety comes completely finished with the R. HARRIS & CO. edgemark; the high wire rim trimmed down and a dark patina. The "Unfinished" variety has no edge mark; a high wire rim and a distinctly orange-red patina. MacNeil speculated that the R. Harris firm put an edgemark and patina only on those medals that were sold, and that more were struck than sold. He estimates that not more than 200-300 medals of both varieties were struck. Perhaps the reason for this very small mintage is that committee members had to purchase them rather than receiving them gratis, as had been the custom.

More recent scholarship has established that the dies for this medal were cut by the Keller Mechanical Engraving Company of Brooklyn, NY. The probability is high that if the firm cut the die for the medal, then they were likely to have struck it too, since it is well established that the company had this capacity. The R. Harris rim mark is not an indication that that company struck this medal as R. Harris did not have a manufacturing facility. It is not unusual for a retail jeweler to have special order items marked with its name by the third party manufacturer. Medallic Art Company, for example, did this for many years for Tiffany &



Co. From our 2007 Auction Seventy Seven #426 where it sold for \$3,220.00.

#### **CALVIN COOLIDGE, 1925**

The medal is looped and was once suspended by a blue ribbon giltstamped INAUGURAL/ COMMITTEE with a plain rectangular brass header at top. The suspension ribbon is now missing.

Since the Inaugural Committee was pressed for funds, it could not afford the traditional practice of presenting a medal to each of its members. They did, however, order special badges with an attached medal bearing the portrait of the President. They were so designed that the medal could be detached from the ribbon and used as a charm. This piece is often used as a substitute by collectors for the Official Medal which is beyond the financial reach of most collectors.

The last complete example to reach the auction block was in our 2009 Auction Seventy Nine where Edward Stellwagen's named badge brought \$4427.50. The charm alone should bring in the \$1500-2000 range.

Constitution, "Old Ironsides", surrounded by Longfellow's famous lines, "Thou too sail on, O Ship of State, Sail on, O Union, strong and great." Beneath the ship, Manship placed a winged woman meant to represent the present day "Ship of State. Many collectors believe this to be the handsomest of all the bronze inaugural medals. 1500 of them were struck by the U.S. Mint. (I+)

This medal displays a bare minimum of this. 7500 of these medals were struck in bronze at the U.S. Mint and sold to the public (G)



The reverse legend: PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA INAUGURATED/ JANUARY 20TH 1961 encloses the interior portion of the Presidential Seal. 7,500 of these medals were struck in silver and sold to the public. (F-G)

# 305. RARE KENNEDY-JOHNSON INAUGURAL MEDAL. JFK-LBJ 1961-2. 70mm. Bronze. Philip Kraczkowski, Sc. Uniface. Edge marked: ROBBINS BRONZE. About Uncirculated with just a hint of rub on JFK's cheek. Obverse with jugate portraits of Kennedy and Johnson to the left in a plain field. The reverse, which once had green felt glued to it, has had the felt removed and is now blank.

As related by MacNeil, Vice President Johnson was greatly

disappointed by not having his portrait on the official medal. He exerted such pressure on the Inaugural Committee that they contracted with the Robbins Company to strike a special medal for Johnson and commissioned Philip Kraczkowski to model the portrait. This uniface medal was presented in gold to the Vice President. An unknown number was struck in bronze, possibly given to Johnson for him to distribute as gifts. There are two edge varieties. The first is edge marked R within a diamond followed by 4 horizontal lines. The second, offered here, is marked ROBBINS BRONZE. The following year, the company used the obverse of this medal and combined it with a reverse showing the Presidential and Vice Presidential seals as part of its short-lived Executive Series. It struck 2000 in silver and 4,000 in bronze for commercial sale. The bronze medals were edge marked: GENUINE BRONZE/ ROBBINS, ATTLEBORO. An elusive medal - even the fabulous Dreyfuss Collection lacked an example. This is only the sixth specimen we have offered since 1981.


Although we do not have the supporting auction envelopes, we have been able to trace the pedigree of this medal back to our 1988 Sale of the Paul Magriel Collection (#243 – \$385.00.) It then appeared in our 2002 sale of the Dan Hansen Collection (#39 - \$1265.00) and then to our 2007 Auction Seventy Seven (#441 - \$1098.00.) It last appeared in Stack's 2008 Sale of 2/27/08 (#3637) where it realized \$2070.00. The medal was plated in all of these sales and thus our pedigree can be confirmed.

#### RICHARD M. NIXON, 1969

06. MARRIOTT SIGNATURE LUCITE ENCASEMENT. RMN 1969-6 var. Mint Condition. This is a gold plated bronze official medal encased in lucite with a black band running across the bottom which is inscribed in gold: EDNA MAY JONES / WITH APPRECIATION/ (facsimile signature of) WILLARD MARRIOTT/CHAIRMAN, INAUGURAL COMMITTEE 1969. The medal is housed in its original black presentation box with EDNA MAY JONES' name gilt stamped on the cover (which is slightly damaged at bottom left, as shown.) When he became aware of the President's plans to have Balfour make a lucite encasement, Chairman Marriott decided to do the same. He ordered a mere 100 pieces, each one of which was individually

named to the recipient. Decidedly rare and missing in most collections. (H)

307. "IN HONOR OF CALIFORNIANS IN THE WHITE HOUSE", 1972. 38mm. .999 Silver. Ralph J. Menconi, Sc. (Obv.) (MACO) Uncirculated, with a very tiny rim mark at 9:00. The obverse of this medal is identical to the official inaugural medal and was struck from the die prepared for the so-called "State Department Medal." Below the bust are the incused dates 1969-1973. The reverse bears a linear map of California at left and, at right, a 7 line inscription. IN HONOR OF/ CALIFORNIANS/ IN THE/ WHITE HOUSE/ DECEMBER 5 J 1972/ BLAIR HOUSE.

Apparently a reception was held in late 1972 for those members of the White House staff who hailed from California. An unknown number of these silver medals were given as gifts. They must have been few and number and highly prized as this is only the second example we have ever seen! The other example, which brought \$1495.00 in our 2001 Arlie Slabaugh Sale did

not have the incused dates below the bust. For those collectors who indulge in the inaugural subspecialty of collecting unofficial medals utilizing official inaugural dies, this is a must-buy!

Only 500 of these matched sets were struck. (\$900-1100)

This was the first time that process sets were offered for sale to the general public.

However, the set was marketed almost as an afterthought. It was not advertised widely and thus only a mere 23 of the process sets were actually numbered and sold. These sets were numbered 16 through 38. The first 15 numbers were reserved for possible use as gifts to VIPs, however, they were never issued. (G-H)



314. DIE TRIAL OF THE GEORGE BUSH VICE PRESIDENTIAL INAUGURAL RECEPTION MEDAL WITH ERROR 1980 DATE. 39mm. Nickel-Silver. Reeded Edge. (MACO). Obverse with center portrait of George Bush, his name above. In small letters beneath the bust, JANUARY 20, 1980. The reverse is inscribed VICE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES within a band around the Vice Presidential eagle.

This is a true "die trial" struck before all the pressure is increased on the press to fully bring up all the detail with a single blow. This medal was intended as a give-away to those attending the Vice President's reception during the 1981 inaugural festivities. Several thousand of these medals were struck by MACO before someone noticed that the date was 1980 instead of 1981! MACO

hurriedly retooled the die and struck the requisite number of medals with the correct 1981 date. The error medals were all supposedly melted or destroyed. However, as always seems to be the case, a few of these error medals escaped the melting pot. We know for certain of the existence of two of these medals. They have been sold at auction several times at prices ranging from \$402.50 to \$713.00

#### **RONALD REAGAN 1985**

#### 315. MATCHED SERIAL NUMBER SET OF FOUR MEDALS.

Mico Kaufman, Sc. (Medallic Art Co.) A set of four of the five medals that were available for purchase by the public. Included are 29mm 14k Gold in matte finish (.87 oz.); 38mm Bronze and Silver and the 70mm Bronze medals. Each medal bears the serial number "272". Five piece sets (which would have included the 63mm silver medal) were not produced because the Inaugural Committee retained the exclusive distributorship of that medal.

The marketing scheme for the 1985 medals was a complicated affair. The Medallic Art Company manufactured and sold through a distribution network the bronze, small silver and gold medals with an antique finish. The Franklin Mint manufactured and, along with the Inaugural Committee, sold the small silver and gold medals with a proof finish and a 1" proof silver MPC. Inaugural Committee was the sole distributor of the traditional 2 1/2" large silver medal with an antique finish. The result of this was that some collectors didn't know about the antique finish medals; some didn't know about the proof finish medals and, most didn't know about the large silver medal. This proof finish medal is often missing in the collections of those who were not on the Franklin Mint of Inaugural Committee mailing lists. There was very little advertising done outside of direct mail with the result that those in the numismatic community were not even aware of the proof medal variations. (\$900 - 1050)

Many people think that the Reagan-Bush second term began with the public inauguration on Monday, January 21, 1985. However, if that was true, we would have been without a President and Vice President for one day, since his first term would have expired the previous day. The public inauguration was held on Monday because of a long-standing tradition that it not be held on the Christian Sabbath. However, so that there would be continuity of office, a private inaugural ceremony was held in the White House on Sunday, where Reagan and Bush were officially sworn in by the Chief Justice of the United States.

On five other occasions, the usual inaugural day fell on a Sunday and two ceremonies, one private and the other public, were similarly held. The dates of these inaugurations are commemorated by being impressed on the edges of this medal: 1821; 1849; 1877; 1917 and 1957. Similarly, the date 1985 is also recorded. These official medals were struck by Medallic Art Company and were distributed to the several hundred VIPs in attendance at the Sunday ceremony. (\$1600-1900)



This medal differs from the medal offered for sale to the public in a number of ways; (1) the obverse legend reads GEORGE WALKER BUSH rather than GEORGE W. BUSH; (2) there is a facsimile signature on the obverse whereas on the official medal there is none; (3) the border on the reverse is enameled cobalt blue.

This is the medal the way it looked when it was first proposed to the Presidential Inaugural Committee by Medalcraft Mint. The President liked his portrait, but did not care for the use of his middle name nor for the facsimile signature on the obverse. The appropriate changes were ordered by the Medals Committee and the obverse design was changed to meet the new specifications. There was no particular objection to the enameled reverse, but due to the time pressure of getting the medal into the hands of the public, it was felt that the enameling process would take more time than was available. A very limited, but unknown number of these medals were struck for examination by the President and select members of the Inaugural Committee. (\$1500-2000)

#### **GEORGE W. BUSH. 2005**

320. THREE PIECE GOLD MEDAL SET. This set includes the 2 3/4" bronze and fine silver medals and a 1 1/4" 14k gold (29.6 grams) medal. Each medal bears the serial number "137". In a departure from previous world's fairs, the award medals for the Columbian Exposition were not given on a competitive basis – they were all of a single class, struck in bronze and presented to each and every exhibitor. Although some exhibitors offered to pay for gold or silver copies, the Solicitor General issued an opinion that they could not be struck. This medal was presented to Fr. Klingelfuss of Basil who exhibited watches.

Saint Gaudens' original design for the reverse was rejected by prudish Treasury Department officials because it displayed a nude male youth. The Mint then asked its own Charles Barber for a suitable replacement. On the obverse, the hooded figure with beard and hooked nose to the right side of Columbus is none other than Augustus Saint Gaudens himself- the only known self portrait of the great master. (G-H)

Obverse view of the Libby Prison War Museum which was town down, transported and reconstructed on the Columbian Exposition grounds, where it served as a tourist attraction. The reverse contains a long inscription detailing the history of the prison which was used to house Northern prisoners of war in Richmond, VA. during the Civil War.

The building that was later to become the Libby Prison was originally built in 1845 by Luther Libby and was occupied by Libby & Sons, ships chandlers and grocers. In 1861 it was

taken over by the Confederates and converted into a prison. The building was moved to Chicago and reconstructed there in 1889 and converted into a National War Museum. This is one of the scarcest and most popular of the 24 or so large pot metal medals made for the exposition. (F-G)

The U.S. Mint struck only 2,000 of these medals in bronze - far fewer than the numbers struck for the official award medals for the Columbian and the 1904 Saint Louis Expositions.

In a letter to exhibitors from the Secretary of the PPIE Award System, it was stated, "Following the custom of all expositions, and as already explained to exhibitors, the Medal of Award in each case is made of Bronze. By virtue of this fact, exhibitors are expected to have their medals PLATED, at their own expense. If the award be that of Grand Prize, Medal of Honor or Gold Medal, have the medal corresponding to the Diploma GOLD plated. If the award be Silver Medal, have the medal SILVER plated. (3) The bottom panel has been completely erased including Kilenyi's signature and an award inscription substituted According to Weidhaas, "This medal never got past the contemplated stage. No medals were awarded by the New York World's Fair Corporation."

This is only the fourth example of this pattern award medal known to us (although there are undoubtedly others such as the piece plated in Weidhaas.) (H-I)

A rare medal - missing from both Garrett and Steinberg. The last two numismatic auction appearances of this medal were both in Stacks-Bowers sales. An impaired Very Fine in their September 2009 sale netted \$4,025.00 while a piece described as "Choice Mint State" offered in the 8/13 ANA Sale of the Charles Wharton Collection (Ex-1981 Springfield Sale; #4149; 1986 Dreyfuss Sale, #51951 1990 Schenkel Collection, #4039.) brought a hefty \$9988.00. The piece offered here, certainly the equal of the aforesaid Wharton medal, has a reserve of \$6000.00.

As Julian notes, there is no proof that this medal was struck

by the U.S. Mint. Indeed, the mention of the Baldwin firm strongly suggests otherwise. However, nothing changes the fact that this is one of the most desirable and elusive of medals honoring American army heroes. (\$1500-2000)

This is an early striking from the original dies. There is a diagnostic "blister" that appears immediately to the right of the S in PUGNIS. The obverse of this medal is quite nice and would be a more than an acceptable display piece for an exhibit of obverse and reverse dies. (G)

twice who gives in time).

The Congressional authorization of this medal in Gold was a result of Vanderbilt's 1862 gift of the use of his Steamer Vanderbilt in the War effort. Vanderbilt had originally build the ship "...for the purpose of demonstrating that individual enterprise could, without the aid of governmental encouragement, place upon the oceans steamships equal at least in magnitude, power and speed, to any which had been constructed under governmental patronage and protection in any part of the world." In March of 1862, he was requested by President Lincoln to use his ship to prevent the "Merrimac" from getting out of Hampton Roads. When asked to name his price for this undertaking, Vanderbilt replied that he would make a gift of her to the government for the service proposed. The government not only had the use of the ship for the specific proposed purpose, but for several years thereafter. (G)

This medal may be Julian's SC-66 as the only way in which the two medals differ is in size i.e. this medal is 51.2mm and SC-66 is said to be 47mm. It is possible that the Julian size is an error. There are apparently two variations in this medal when awarded. The first, exemplified by the medal offered here, is engraved as above. This medal is called "The Society Orator's Medal for the encouragement of Oratory and Elocution." It is awarded to the author of the best original speech in a public competitive trial during the week of Commencement. Each of the two Literary Societies chooses two members to compete for this medal and the decision on the merits of the contestants is made by a committee of gentlemen not connected with the University.

The second variation is called "The Cincinnati Orator's Medal" (Baker T-345) and was established in honor of the Society of the Cincinnati of Virginia and is awarded by the Faculty to the author of the best oration submitted during the session in competition therefor provided it has sufficient intrinsic merit. This medal has not been awarded every year and is considerably scarcer that the above medal which is awarded annually. When awarded, the engraved inscription titles the medal *as "CINCINNATI ORATOR'S MEDAL."* 



Miles Poindexter (1868-1946) graduated from Washington and Lee University with a law degree in 1891. He moved to the state of Washington in 1892 where be began the practice of law. He served as an assistant prosecuting attorney for Spokane County and in 1904, became a judge of the Superior Court. (1904-1908) He then served one term as a Congressman (1909-1911) and was then elected to the US Senate where he served from 1911 to 1923, He was defeated for reelection in 1922. President Harding then appointed him as Ambassador to Peru (1923-1928) He ran again for the Senate in 1928 and was again defeated.

This is one of the most sought-after of U.S. Mint Medals as it is of interest to the following topical collectors; George Washington, Robert E. Lee, School Medals, U.S. Mint Medals, & gold medals. We can find no prior auction record for one of these gold medals. (\$4000-6000)

This is the only U.S. Mint medal engraved by Charles Lang, a Worcester die sinker and general engraver who is best known

for his own Civil War storecard token (MA 970A). Although Mint records show that 163 silver medals were struck, we have found only three other modern auction records. We sold an 1862 dated XF specimen in our 2002 Auction for \$143.75 (F-G)

This medal was struck in the 1877-1882 period and was awarded in gold. US Mint records record a total of 33 medals struck in gold during this period; none in silver and only five in copper, bronzed. We could locate but one auction appearance in copper – the 1986 Dreyfuss Sale (#5560) had an uncirculated specimen which brought \$220.00. (H-I)

This medal was first struck in 1883. The US Mint striking

records in the back of the Julian book for the period 1883-1904 do not differentiate between the First and Second Class medals. However, there is no record of any copper medal struck during this period for either class medal nor have we been able to find any sale appearance for a copper example although silver specimens are relatively plentiful. (H)

XF/AU with a tiny bit of very light verdigris within the deepest parts of the relief. Bust of Lindbergh to half left superimposed over a propeller and flanked by the date, 1927 MAY 21. The legend reads: NEW YORK CHARLES A. LINDBERGH PARIS.

Karl Frederick Skoog (1878-1934) was born in Sweden. He came to this county and studied under Bela Pratt. He did most of his sculpture in the New England area and is responsible for a number of World War I monuments in that region. His only other known medallic efforts are a 1918 portrait plaque of C.W. Leadbeater; a 1920 portrait plaque of Ralph Waldo Emerson and a 1926 portrait medal of Harvard President Charles Eliot. (F)

It was returned to us when the successful bidder had it tested for silver and it proved not to be so. We then put it in the safe and forgot about it until we unearthed it a few months ago while doing our annual inventory. We were still in doubt as to its metal content so we prevailed upon our friend Ernie Latter to have it scientifically tested. The result was a complete surprise – the medal was struck in palladium plated brass (2% Palladium ...87% copper and 11% Zinc) This is only the second such specimen known to us. The example in Princeton's Newman Collection of Aeronautical Medals is

With the exception of the tried and true examples of medals relating to our Revolutionary War and to Benjamin Franklin, medals from this period are generally under represented in our sales. We are again pleased to have a select consignment from Tony J. Lopez, the well-known and respected researcher in this field. We have asked Tony to contribute his expertise in the description of his lots. We are particularly pleased to have been chosen as the vehicle for the publication of important new information with respect to some of these pieces.

PHILLIP II KING OF THE NEW WORLD - MARRIAGE OF PHILLIP II AND ISABELLA OF VALOIS, 1559. Betts-5. Copper-Gilt. VF/XF. Holed twice at 12:00. 38 mm, 28.0 grams. Obverse: Bust of Philip II. PHILIPPVS. II. HISPAN. ET NOVI ORBIS OCCIDVI REX. In exergue: J. PAVL. POG. F (Giovanni Paolo Poggini Fecit). Reverse: Bust of Queen Isabella. .ISABELLA REGINA PHILIPPI. II. HISPAN. REGIS. This medal by Giovanni Poggini is one of the earliest Colonial American medals listed in Betts, proclaiming Phillip II as King of Spain and the New World. It commemorates the 1559 marriage of Phillip II to Isabella of Valois. The unusual pair of closely drilled holes above Phillip II reveals the medal's important use; portraits from this era show that it was customary for medals to be sewn through those holes and attached to a hat or lapel. This display of allegiance was likely reserved for important supporters and members of the court. The underlying copper is bleeding through the gilt on the high points of the medal, evidence of long use. During the reign of Phillip II, this medal - with gilt originally appearing to be a gold medal - was worn as a prominent emblem of Royal stature.

This is much more than an historical medal; it is also an example of renaissance art and sculpture by Poggini. This is an exceedingly rare as a struck example of this medal. This is the only known gilt-copper example extant, and one of only two known struck in copper (with only 2 other struck examples known in silver). A near pristine struck example of Betts-5 in copper sold in the Heritage Adams sale (Lot 3552) for \$8,812.50. While perhaps imperfect from a numismatic standpoint; the history of the medal - its use reflected by the sewing holes and worn gilt - should hold a far greater value to the true historian. \$2,000+

Louise Bénédicte de Bourbon was born with a frail arm and was short and small in stature with crooked teeth. Despite this, she was pursued by a Prince because of her beautiful features. She was described jealously by the Duchess of Orléans as "not taller than a child ten years". She became a princess when she married Louis Auguste de Bourbon, Duke of Maine, the legitimized son of Louis XV, at the Palace of Versailles in 1692. Louise Bénédicte became rebellious and ambitious, and began to hold her own court at the Château de Sceaux, emulating the Royal Court. She eventually became involved in political intrigue, working on a coup to dethrone the eight year-old Louis XV, and replace him with his uncle, Phillip V of Spain. Under a new French king, her husband the Duke of Maine would be appointed as Regent, replacing the Duke of Orleans. It is believed that she was the mistress of the Cardinal Melchior de Polignac who was involved in the Cellamare Conspiracy of 1718 to overthrow the Duke of Orleans. She was arrested along with the Duke in December of 1718, and released in 1720, after which she led a more subdued life until her death in 1736.

On June 11, 1703, she created the Order of the Honey Bee (l'ordre de la Mouche à Miel), a personal chivalric order consisting of 39 handpicked members. During their meetings each member wore a ceremonial robe embroidered with silver thread, a wig in the shape of a beehive, and one of these l'ordre de la Mouche à Miel medals in gold. The reverse legend "She is small, yes, but nonetheless gives cruel wounds" makes reference to Louise Bénédicte's pride in her small stature and nasty disposition. At the time, the Académie Royale des Inscriptions et Médailles approved medal designs under Louis XV, and required all legends on medals to be in Latin - yet this medal curiously has an obverse legends whose abbreviation spells out a legend in French. Translation of the complicated abbreviation on the obverse was likely understood only by members of the order, indicating that the medals were made clandestinely in mutual defiance of Royal authority.

No original examples of the medals are known to exist. In the 19<sup>th</sup> century, restrikes were also struck in silver, copper, and coppergilt; presumably with the original dies. The silver examples are quite rare. This medal has two cornucopias straddling the number 1 on the edge, indicating an 1880's strike of high gold content. **This is the only known example in gold** extant which matches the composition and appearance of the original medals. \$1000+

Betts described the Betts-111 medal (from an example in the Bibliotheque Nàtionale) as having this reverse, but a younger bust of the king on the obverse and Latin legend. This medal was struck with the original Betts-111 reverse, but has an older bust of Louis XV, with legend in French.

There is a great deal of mystery surrounding this medal. Betts reason for associating the medal with the "Society of Merchants, founded for the Islands" is not spelled out in his reference. Betts -111 with this older bust of Louis XV is described and discussed in a 1905 American Journal of Numismatics article entitled "An Undescribed American Colonial Medal": "A CORRESPONDENT sends us a photogravure of a medal struck in France, which is similar to Betts, No. 111, but with a different obverse, and in gold, while the only metal named or described by Betts is copper. . . The bust is of a man of perhaps about 30. The medal is no doubt very rare, especially in this metal. The only means of deciding upon its date of issue is the very uncertain time when this bust was engraved, which is probably now impossible to determine unless by a search in the archives of the mint. Louis succeeded his great-grandfather when only five years old (1715), so that if we are to judge by the apparent age at which he is represented, this medal can hardly have been issued much before 1745, or possibly even later..." (This gilt medal, purchased in the 1990's from a seller in France, could be the example discussed in the 1905 AJN.) While the 1715 date

marks the beginning of the reign of Louis XV, A mature Louis XV was likely struck sometime from 1730 – 1750. The reverse legend referencing it being in "All the World" with an image of the French Warship at sea suggesting French worldwide Naval power. Maybe a more appropriate statement for a royal making his own decisions rather than an infant king. Betts-111 of any variety has never appeared at auction and was missing in all of the important offerings of Betts medal collections including the LaRiviere, Ford and Adams sale. This is one of only two known examples, and currently the only known example of any variety of Betts-111 in private hands. \$3500+

While included in Benjamin Betts study of the John Law medals, Adams later determined that this medal was not struck specifically as a John Law medal. This medal was struck in the 1720's for the Regiment de Calotte, a light hearted and satirical fraternal group known as the "Regiment of the Skull-Cap". While not struck referring to John Law, there is a connection to Law. This "Burlesque Association" in Paris "which jested on all events" actually declared John Law as their leader, awarding him a satirical commission as their "General of the Skull Caps". In 1719, they had entitled Law as the "Primate of the Mississippi" poking fun at special dispensation he received from the Abbé Tencin (having bribed him) to be converted to Catholicism to raise Law's standing in France. A pristine example hammered in our June 22, 2013 auction for \$1400. (G)

Obverse: Bust of King Louis XV legend surrounding: LUD · XV REX · CHRISTIANISS (Louis XV, the most Christian king), Below bust "FM" in ligature for engraver Francois Marteau. Reverse: A figure, presumably King Louis XV, stands on a terrestrial globe, bareheaded and in the image of a Roman hero, giving orders to two genii who spring to his right and left, charged with mathematical instruments; above them is a group of stars, (possibly representing the Southern Cross), legend above: MENSOR ORBIS TERRARUM (it measures the earth's surface), in exergue NISSIS AD ÆQUATOREM ET POLUM ARCTICUM ASTRONOMIS M.DCC.XLIV (Astronomers sent to the equator and arctic pole 1744).

This medal is the plate example and was the subject of the January-February 2012 MCA Advisory article "Inspired by Sir Newton: 1744 French Geodesic Mission Medal". This medal commemorates the French Academy of Sciences 1735 sponsorship of two explorations to the equator and Lapland near the North Pole to measure the size and shape of Earth. While the medal is dated 1744 in reverse exergue (the end of the expedition) the medal was designed by sculptor Edmé Bouchardon in 1761, and thus likely struck in 1761 or 1762. The joint French-Spanish equatorial mission was led by French astronomers Charles Marie de La Condamine, Pierre Bouguer, Louis Godin and Spanish geographers Jorge Juan and Antonio de Ulloa. The exploration of La Comandine to Central and South America lasted between 1735-1745; traveling through Central and South America to Quito in Spanish Peru (now Ecuador) which was the closest approachable spot near the equator. This was the first ever international scientific expedition, and an important historic event which proved Isaac Newton's theory that the Earth was not perfectly round, but an oblate spheroid, bulging in the center. Today there is a large pyramid monument erected on the equator in Ecuador commemorating this expedition.

The medal has a cornucopia/ARGENT edgemark indicating that the medal is a post-1880 restrike – but careful examination of the medal proves the edgemark dating impossible. The powerful steam coining press - first introduced in the 1830's - would thereafter produce medals and coins with flat edges. This medal's characteristic concave edge and witness line prove definitively that the medal was created using earlier 18th century technology-struck (or rather squeezed) in a screw press with a serrated collar no later than the 1820's. This medal likely sat in inventory at the Paris Mint for decades, if not more than a century. It left the mint somehow after 1880 – but not without someone first placing the cornucopia edgemark on it first. Given the medal's attributes, it can only be an original strike, likely 18th century - despite the misleading later edge-mark.

This medal one of very few contemporaneous medals commemorating exploration of the New World and represents a glaring omission which unquestionably belongs in Betts. It is also extremely rare in any form with only six known examples: one in silver (present example), four bronze, and one of unknown composition. Two bronze examples are at the ANS, an example of unknown composition is at the Bibliothèque de l'Observatoire de Paris (Paris Observatory Library), and three modern auction results (and no others); one silver, and two bronze. **This is the only known silver example** – a unique opportunity to obtain one of the most important unlisted Betts medals. \$2500+

The two sides of this medal commemorate two different successes of British Admiral George Lord Anson; the obverse; his defeat of the French off Cape Finistere, Spain during the War of Austrian Succession, and the reverse; his circumnavigation of the globe between 1740-1744. While sailing around the world, Anson visited Portuguese and Spanish America, raiding Spanish mining settlements on the coast of Chile, but in the process lost nearly all of his fleet. Anson crossed the Pacific in their one remaining ship, the Centurion, and managed to capture a Spanish treasure galleon near the Philippines. He sold this prize for £400,000 in Canton, China, making him a wealthy man. The Centurion was the first British warship to enter Chinese waters. In the process, his crew had suffered immense hardship; when Anson reached England in June 1744, more than half the original crew of nearly 2,000 men had died. According to Chris Eimer, the medal may have been commissioned by George's brother Thomas Anson. A pristine example sold in the Heritage Adams sale for \$1,762.50. (\$1000+)

This 1753 dated jeton, incredibly rare even as a restrike, was missing in the extensive Ford and LaRiviere collections. We are aware of only three original examples in silver (Baker ex. Adams, Newman, and the Bank of Canada) and one in bronze (ANS); and three of these later restrikes: two in silver (Baker ex. Adams and the present example) and one in bronze (European collection). Baker dates this restrike to the 1950's. While not an original 18<sup>th</sup> century strike, it is still an acceptable excessively rare later variety of the nearly impossible to obtain Betts-388. (G)

American in loincloth, perhaps depicting a slave, standing before a hut and leaning upon a spade, looking towards the sea, three ships sailing in the distance, in exergue: COMPAGNIE.DE | LA.GUYANNA | FRANCAIS. Also referred to as possibly a "silver piece for the colony of Cayenne", an earlier footnote by the editors of Betts places this medal following Betts-513, which would date the medal circa 1766.

The present example has an unusual edge-mark: cornucopia 1 (for high content of silver) No. 50/500. The numbering on the edge clearly defines this as a collector piece from the mid-20th century, when the Paris mint made numbered restrikes of medals on a subscription basis. The series apparently had few subscribers, and 500 of the medals were never made; these numbered medals (one of which was the Daniel Morgan Comitia Americana medal) are rarely seen, and curiously are always numbered in multiples of 5. Betts-534 is virtually uncollectible; there are no known auction records, and Betts-534 was missing in the LaRiviere, Ford, and Adams sales. Ultimately, even as a modern restrike, and with an obverse of Louis XV, the present medal is unique, and fills an important hole as **the only example known of any variety of Betts-534 extant**. (G-H)

The Wedgwood & Bentley back-mark definitively dates the

medallion's creation from 1775-1780; after Wedgwood had perfected the blue jasperware process in 1775 and before Bentley's death in 1780. Both Josiah Wedgwood and Thomas Bentley were friendly associates and correspondents of Franklin, and had close fraternal ties in Freemasonry as well as co-founding the Club of 13 with Bentley and joining the Lunar Society of Birmingham in 1775 with Wedgwood. The Lunar Society met monthly during the full moon and had a membership which included many of the

greatest scientific, philosophical, and industrial greats of the time including Matthew Boulton, Joseph Priestly, Thomas Percival, James Watt, and Erasmus Darwin.

There is an area at 7:30 where the jasperware dip was unevenly applied which should be noted. This is actually a sign of a very early piece while they were still experimenting with their blue jasperware in 1775. More important is the fact that the jasperware dip bleeds slightly onto the cameo which definitively dates it to mid-1775. Wedgwood perfected the process later in 1775 by separately applying the cameo and firing it so there would be no bleeding (Reilly & Savage, *Wedgwood: The Portrait Medallions*, Pg. 17). The holes on the back were used in the process of applying the blue, and are an authenticating feature.

This handsome neoclassical stylized bust of Franklin was modeled by Wedgewood artist William Hackwood in 1775 (Wedgwood: The Portrait Medallions; Reilly and Savage, 1973, pg. 145). Franklin was in England at the time; and considering Wedgwood's friendship with Franklin, the representation is accurate and almost certainly done from life. This is one of the earliest portraits of Franklin produced at Etruria, and would likely date closer to 1775 date when Franklin left England to return to Pennsylvania.

While Wedgwood & Bentley made several varieties of Franklin Portrait medallions, this particular early design and size in blue jasperware is extremely rare; the only examples we could locate are at the Smithsonian and Carnegie Museum of Art. From the Stack's January 2010 Americana Sale, Lot # 4633 where it realized \$4,025. \$3500+



In addition to the "common" fur cap variety, Jean Baptiste Nini created several varieties of his Franklin terracotta medallions, including two varieties with Franklin wearing a Phrygian Liberty cap, Franklin bare headed with a star above his head, large format with Franklin bare headed (in 1779), and this variety with Franklin wearing spectacles with legend surrounding. Franklin invented bifocals and the lightning rod seen in this medallion's design which honors Franklin as inventor and scientist.

At first glance this appears to be the same bust as that seen on the common Fur Cap variety - but with a larger date and different legend; using cinquefoils for punctuation, and missing Franklin's first initial B. Upon closer comparison, however, the artistry of Franklin's bust is a separately accomplished and completely different rendition by Nini than the common fur cap bust. Franklin is leaning back more and to his right, and the proportional size of the head to the shoulder is different. His hair detail is completely different. Franklin's clothing has a smaller round neck ruffle, the lapel and button holes are larger, the buttons and button holes are further spaced apart, the fur cap sits slightly higher on Franklin's head and has less detail and the

angle of the fur cap and tassel differs. Franklin's face has softer features; seen especially in his nose and neck, and his eye behind the spectacles is prominently larger. The truncation of the bust is not squared off at the front, and the coat of arms of Franklin has shorter leaves, sits more upright, and differs in that the lightning bolt is vertical (vs. horizontal), and the date and signature on the truncation are on both sides (vs. only the left) of the coat of arms.

This medallion is catalogued and pictured on page 115 of A. Storelli's Jean-Baptiste Nini. Sa vie.-Son oeuvre. 1717-1786 (1896) and numbered LXIII (63). The example plated is from the "collection du prince A. de Broglie" and today continues to reside in the collection at Château Chaumont; remaining where the terra cotta medallions were originally produced by Nini. Until now, the Storelli LXIII at Château Chaumont was the only known example in existence. Curiously enough, the Château example has several areas of disturbance to the rim; characteristics which are not seen in the 1896 photo used by Storelli. This example has exactly the same rim characteristics: breaks from 6:00-7:00 outside the frame, a break at 8:00 outside the frame, a clip along the rim at 10:30, and a light vertical dig at 3:00. With this example precisely matching the flaws on the Château Chaumont piece, there is no question that the matching flaws were in the original mold that created both nearly identically flawed pieces, - and not later matching damage which miraculously occurred identically over time to two different medallions. The photo in Storelli therefore must have been retouched to remove those flaws and make the rims appear more pristine. Between the two known pieces, this example appears to have a slightly earlier progression of the flaws, and may well be the earliest medallion of the two casts. Ultimately, the rim flaws evident on the original mold may have failed, and could explain the later production of the Franklin with spectacles sans legend (a rare example offered as the next lot) which has the same size and design bust of the central portion of the mold with Franklin's bust; but has had the rims and lettering removed.

This is rarest of all Franklin Nini medallions, and the only known example in private hands. No example of this variety of Franklin Nini has ever appeared in the marketplace. Beautiful silky example showing the incredible detail of Nini's artistry with his use of the extraordinarily fine clay from Château Chaumont. Housed in a custom display case which was designed to protect the fragile terracotta medallion while allowing it to be safely viewed from both sides. This offering presents a unique opportunity to obtain an incredible rarity which is is the Holy Grail for collectors of Franklin and Nini. \$25,000+

Storelli describes this medallion as similar to the preceding Storelli LXIII but "par l'absenced'encadrement et de legend" (missing the legends and framing). As explained in the preceding lot, the relative size and design of this smaller medallion appears to match the interior bust of Franklin seen on Storelli LXVIII. This bust, like Storelli LXIII, is entirely

different than the bust seen on the common fur cap variety.

aftercasts in the late 19th century. The aftercasts were not created using the clay at Château Chaumont and are smaller in diameter with a slightly smaller design as well as thicker and heavier in weight than seen on this piece. More than anything, the Balon aftercasts have a different "feel" and are more granular than the silky feel of this piece made from the fine clay at Château Chaumont.

This small terra cotta medallion with Franklin wearing spectacles is excessively rare, with less than a dozen examples known - the majority of which are likely Balon aftercasts. The medallion has a uniform rich red/brown coloration with a few small areas of disturbance seen on the shoulder, fold of the coat, lapel and highest point of the fur cap which could be professionally restored. Still, overall an excellent example of great rarity. The Ford example sold in a Stack's May 2006 auction for \$11,500. \$7000+

This dramatic large Franklin Nini medallion has a legend attributed to French Finance Minister Turgot, honoring Franklin as scientist and inventor of the lightning rod. There is disturbance seen in portions of some of the lettering, but the entire legend can be easily read, and this is an overall pleasing example with a uniform rich red/brown coloration. In hand the medallion has the silky feel of the Château Chaumont clay used in Nini's original medallions.

The large 1779 dated Franklin Nini medallions are very rare, with less than 20 examples known, nearly all of which are domiciled in permanent institutional collections. Only six or seven are

privately held, and examples of Storelli LXVIII are rarely offered in the marketplace. The Gilbert Steinberg example which sold at Stack's back in January 2005 (Lot # 2261) realized \$9,775, and more recently a stained example sold in the Freeman's November 2014 sale (Lot # 583) for \$8,125. An important and dramatic centerpiece for the serious Franklin collector. \$7000+

Extremely Fine. Obverse: Sèvres bust of Benjamin Franklin facing right, incuse legend in script surrounding: DOCTEUR FRANKLIN

hand-engraved. Very little has been written about this visually stunning yet enigmatic medallion. Strangely enough, while it is not mentioned in any of the Franklin references, it is listed in the 1999 Edition of Rulau/Fuld's *Medallic Portraits of Washington* (Baker A-206 and C-206). There are, however, some inaccuracies in those descriptions (in addition to mistakenly cross-referencing the medal as Greenslet-GM-19, which it is not) which, when reexamined, unlock important pieces of the mystery of this medal:

- The listing in Rulau/Fuld A-206 (Page 98) describes a single medallion (which they plate above) with Général Washington obverse and Docteur Franklin reverse. All other known examples of the Docteur Franklin medal (and the Général Washington) are uniface. Given the respective angles of the hangers seen on the Rulau/Fuld plate examples, it is impossible for the plate images to be two sides of the same medal as stated.
- 2) Metropolitan Museum. All known examples measure 108 mm. The 82 mm diameter listed in Rulau/Fuld was apparently mistakenly extrapolated and copied from the diameter of the "white metal" medals (the medal portion of which is 82 mm in diameter) which follow the A-206 listing (B-206 and C-206).
- 3) Rulau/Fuld plate only the Général Washington (B-206) from a set of two medallions (B206 and C206); a variety of "bronzed white metal" which are "mounted on soapstone" (ex. Kirtley 1996 auction). This same presentation of the medals appeared in a September 2006 Nye and Co. auction (Lot 485) where they were revealed to be no more than later copies, perhaps souvenirs: described as "Two Terra Cotta Medallions Depicting General Washington and Docteur Franklin" with "the verso fitted with labels detailing them as reproductions with original works in the Metropolitan Museum of Art". The images from the auction show additional "chips, repairs, and losses" which in the images reveal an underlying plaster or terracotta composition.
  - Other than the present example, there are only two other known Docteur Franklin medals extant, both in bronze:
- 1) Toledo Museum of Art (OH), 1907.40, Bronze 108 mm., with hanger.
- 2) Metropolitan Museum of Art (NY), 83.2.161, Bronze, 10.8mm., with hanger. William H Huntington bequeathed 1883 (The Met also had a Général Washington engraved medal)

There is no known recorded documentation pertaining to the creation of this medal, but there are a few clues which help date it and identify the origin. With a French legend, the medal is almost certainly of French manufacture. All know examples are presently in the United States including the present example coming from a large Pennsylvania collection of important Revolutionary War antiques. The Met web site dates the medal to 1776-1800, and attributes the medal to period French sculptor/ engraver Jean Martin Renaud. The bust of Franklin, referred to as the Sèvres bust, was a popular image of Franklin used by the Sèvres potteries in France in the late 1770's. Use of the term "Docteur Franklin" was used while Franklin was in France, and Abbé Jean Claude Richard de Saint-Non's 1778 engraving Le docteur Franklin couronné par la Liberté has a similar right facing profile bust of Franklin above a globe showing America. The legend Général Washington on the companion medal's design would not have been used in France after 1800. Ultimately, the design, texture, and legend firmly place the creation of this medallion sometime in 1770's-1780's France, likely when Franklin was in Paris.

Close examination of this medal as well as a copper example of the Général Washington companion piece at the Massachusetts

Historical Society (missing the back plate exposing the interior) reveals seams indicating the medal is created from five separate pieces comprising: 1) a central struck or cast medallion of Franklin with Docteur Franklin legend hand-engraved; 2) A wire small inner frame; 3) a wider outer frame; 4) A large silver ring (the edge) and; 5) a large flat disc (the back). These five elements have been meticulously soldered together within the outer large solid silver ring, similar to the shell construction of the silver Jefferson and George III large Indian Peace medals- but of much heavier and heartier construction. In fact, the medallion's construction is of such high quality and so carefully assembled that it actually passes the "ring" test!

As further proof of their custom artistry, the hand-engraved legend in script on each of the three known examples is different in close detail and unique from the others (true also of the two known Général Washington medallions). Silver plating partially hides the fine detail of the engraving of the obverse legend on this example; despite this the workmanship is of extremely high quality. It is impossible to determine the composition without damaging the medal. The medal could be silver plated copper, or solid silver, or a combination of parts made of both. The medal appears to be of silver plated copper contained within a solid silver ring. There are a few areas where the copper can very subtly be seen below silver plating, but the silver plating over the inner wire frame and buttons on Franklin's coat seem to have been intentionally brushed to reveal the underlying copper coloring and intentionally accent these areas. This gorgeous large medallion of Docteur Franklin is a unique treasure - a step above the bronze examples - clearly created only for a very important purpose or person. \$12,500+

This is the official French medal marking the peace of Paris in 1783 and the end of hostilities at the end of the Revolutionary War, after which England recognized the independence of the United States. Both obverse and reverse are by Benjamin DuVivier, the engraver who created three important Revolutionary War medals in the Comitia Americana series; including the iconic Washington Before Boston Medal. There were actually two medals struck with this same reverse; the other (Betts-611) having an obverse of Louis XVI executed by Nicolas-Marie Gatteaux. Of the two obverses, the DuVivier seen here is significantly scarcer; the

extensive Ford collection only had a single example of Betts-612 in copper. This medal with rich dark original finish is equal in condition to the Ford example which realized \$1,150 (Stack's May 2006, Lot 285). \$750+

Inscription in Exergue: SCULPSIT ET DICAVIT | AUG. DUPRÉ ANNO | MDCCLXXXIV (Augustin Dupré engraved and dedicated in the year 1784). Plain concave edge with witness line at 11:00.

This incredibly rare and historic medal honoring Benjamin Franklin, designed and engraved by Augustin Dupré, is also closely tied to Franklin's creation of the Libertas Americana (engraved by Dupré) and the early Comitia Americana medals he commissioned while in France. Dated 1784, the reverse allegorical narrative honors Franklin both as scientist/inventor and as statesman. Dupré created many drawings representing the progression of this reverse design, including Hercules standing over his defeated enemies, Minerva pointing at the temple, and Winged Genius hovering over complex machinery. Dupré was working on this medal as early as 1783. A sketch by Dupré in the Boston Public Library shows the same bust of Franklin with a legend in French "BENJ. FRANKLIN MINIS PLEN DES ETATS DEI AMERI MDCCCLXXXIII." (Benjamin Franklin Minister Plenipotentiary of the United States of America 1783). Original medals can be easily distinguished by the lightning bolt which extends through the clouds and above the hand of Winged Genius and the thin drapery seen behind her left wing. The medal is a very early state of the die, missing the peripheral die rust which would later surround the bust of Franklin, and with

an earlier state of the die break between the legs of Genius than seen on the Ford bronze example. Two years later, a new reverse was created dated 1786 (Betts-620) with an inscription within a wreath was paired with the Franklin Natus Boston obverse. For some reason, the Paris mint favored striking Franklin medals with the less elaborate 1786 reverse. This could be due to the early failure of the 1784 original reverse die; evidenced by the die-break which appears between the legs of Winged Genius. A replacement reverse Winged Genius die was created in the 19<sup>th</sup> century which can be easily distinguished by a shorter lightning bolt and more prominent drapery.

This medal is exceedingly rare in bronze with both the original obverse and reverse dies. In 2006 Adams-Bentley recorded only two bronze examples in their census: the John J. Ford example (which last sold at Stacks-Bowers August 2012 auction, Lot 4092, realizing \$15,275.00), and one in a New England collection. Since then two more examples have come forth, an example with numerous contact marks and scratches which appeared in the August 2013 Stacks-Bowers auction (Lot 1010 realized \$11,750), and now this present example. Two original examples of the medal are held in institutions:

A pleasing dark copper strike of the 1786 Frankin Natus Boston medal with the wreath reverse. This is a rather early strike of this medal, exhibiting only a partial "halo" of the die rust surrounding Franklin's bust which are seen on all examples of this medal. This medal is much more common than the Betts-619 Winged Genius medal, but high grade examples are difficult to come by, and a pristine example of this medal From the August 2012 Dorchester Heights Collection (Lot # 4093) sold at Stack's for \$1,880, and an AU example realized \$1,725 in the March 2009 (Lot 5046) Stack's sale. \$1000+

Similar to the 1927 Franklin Day medal, we again see a modern adaptation of the iconic Franklin Natus Boston medal combined with a later commemorative reverse over a century later. Despite its modern manufacture, the medal is unlisted and nothing has been written and little is known about this obscure and excessively rare medal. While there are no reports of the existence or purpose of this medal, the September 20, 1965 issue of the Oshkosh Daily Northwestern reports that Krause publications sponsored coin collector's tours of Europe in 1964 and 1965 led by Numismatic News editor Edward C. Rochette and his wife. This medal is therefore likely a collector or commemorative medal produced during that tour. While more than one copy of this medal was presumably struck for members of the 1965 tour and may remain in those collections, most have disappeared into obscurity, and for now this is the only known available example. Series Numismatic medals of Benjamin Franklin are quite rare and appear in the marketplace no more than once or twice a year. The Steinberg collection of Franklin medals had only three Franklin Series Numismatica medals; two in copper. This medal is much rarer than listed in Greenslet; likely no more common than a low R-6 (in his scale, 16-30 known). (G)

> Franklin Series Numismatica medal, dated 1819, with obverse bust of Franklin engraved by Godel and the reverse inscription rearranged. This unlisted variety is similar to Greenslet's description of the 1819 Greenslet-45 medal with the exception being that the reverse inscription here is only nine lines (vs. ten as described); the difference being that IN AMERICA and FOEDERATA are seen here on a single line. It is complicated describing the varieties of these medals, and could be that Greenslet misdescribed GM-45 with a reverse matching the tenline inscription seen in GM-46 (see next lot) when in fact it had only the nine lines seen here. The GM-45 1819 dated Franklin Series Numismatica medal of any variety with a plain edge is extremely rare. (The rarity of 1819 medals confused by the fact that both Heritage and Stack's have mistakenly catalogued 1818 dated GM-43 medals as "1819" in the last decade, including the Steinberg silver GM-43 which is clearly dated 1818 in the image). This medal is easily an R-8 and could be rarer; we know of only one other example extant of any 1819 dated Benjamin Franklin Series Numismatica medal without the later MONACHII edge mark. There is a long die crack on the reverse at 4:30 extending through and past the U in ILLUSTRIUM which may be the beginning of an early die failure which could explain the rarity of this medal. The rivalry culminated in the Astor Place riot (1849) in New York City where a mob of several thousand anti-Macready/anti-British Forrest partisans protested Macready's performance and did battle with 300 policemen and

the militia. The result was that thirty-one of the rioters were killed and many more were injured. The "Just to Opposers" quotation comes from a sonnet by James Lawson, *To Andrew Jackson*." (G)

The Society of Colorado Pioneers was formed in 1872 when 27 "old settlers" met to form the organization. Membership in the society was limited to all males who had arrived in the Territory prior to 1861. On account of the membership being depleted by the death of practically all of the pioneer men and the failure of sons to carry on, it was decided in 1943 to affiliate with the Pioneer Women of Colorado. This organization then became known as The Pioneer Men and Women of Colorado.

J.W. Watson was born in 1830 in Ohio, arriving in Denver in 1859 where, for a time apparently, he was the manager of the Brown Mining Company of Clear Creek County. This badge is clearly of 19th century manufacture, and so it is possible that it was issued while Colorado was still a territory. Whatever the truth of this, the badge is a dynamic display piece which harkens us back to the days when adventurous men and woman braved the unknown to forge new lives for themselves and broaden the horizons of our country. There were two similar pieces in Stacks 10/07 sale of the John J. Ford Collection which brought \$2587.00 and \$2875.00 respectively.

Based on a letter in the ANS files, it is generally stated that one medal was struck in gold, one in silver and only a mere 35 in bronze in recognition of Parish's generous gifts of money and material. The paucity of auction appearances seems to dictate, however, that if additional medals were indeed struck, they were not many. An Unc. example in our last sale brought \$345.00.

Paul Bosco notes that, "The Janvier reducing machine made it possible to produce medals which started in larger sizes, modeled in soft materials like wax and clay. This is, therefore, one of the most important art medals." Adding even more importance to this medal is its medallist - Alexandre Louis Marie Charpentier (1856-1909) was an important figure in the history of medallic art. At age 23 became an assistant to the engraver Hubert Ponscarme. He was one of the founders of "Les Cinq", the first group organized to promote the Art Nouveau Movement. He won numerous awards including a Grand prize at the 1900 Paris Exposition and the French Legion of Honor. A posthumous exhibition of his medallic work at the American Numismatic Society International Medallic Exhibition in 1910 solidified his reputation as one of the most important figures in medallic art firmament. 

Through the masterful handling of the devices of pictorial perspective, including the subtle gradation of the low relief so that objects meant to seem far away are in extremely low relief with finely incised details, Roty creates the illusion of a

vast expanse. The empty space which surrounds the austere, solemn, allegorical figures heightens the powerful emotion of the scenes. The figures themselves, with their classical restraint, have been compared to Greek statuary." (F)

James Barr Ames (1846-1910) was a U.S. law educator, who popularized the "case-study" method of teaching law. He served as dean of Harvard Law School from 1895 to 1910. The prize, which was established in 1898 and consists of a sum of \$400 and a bronze medal, and is awarded every four years for the most meritorious law book or legal essay written in the English language and published not less than one nor more than five years before the award. This is a rare medal – only the second we have seen. We sold the first on eBay in 2006 for \$218.00.







The subscription price of the silver medals was \$10.00 each, and \$3.00 or \$5.00 for the bronze, depending upon quantity ordered. (G-H)

The fight went a grueling 41 rounds with either fighter being knocked out. Finally, in the 42<sup>nd</sup> round. Nelson hit Gans with a low blow and was disqualified and Gans regained his title. The "Del Monte" was a Goldfield saloon. (G)

Elihu Root was the recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize in 1912 (F)

According to a note in the AJN, The portrait of Schurz was based on a photograph taken of him when he was 40 years of age. The Latin motto has been variously translated as "Where liberty is, there is my fatherland (country).", "Home is where Liberty is." And "Where our country is, there shall liberty dwell." The motto has been attributed to Benjamin Franklin, the libertarian philosopher Algernon Sidney (1622-1683) and James Otis (1725-1783). None of these attributions have been definitive. The medal was distributed by the German-American banker, Paul M. Warburg to friends of Schurz shortly after his death.

Carl Schurz (1829-1906) lived one of the most fascinating and varied public lives in the second half of the 19<sup>th</sup> century. Born in Germany, he was active in the 1848 Revolution. In 1851, he was in Paris as a correspondent for German journal and afterward spent a year teaching in London. He came to the US in 1852, stayed 3 years in Philadelphia before settling in Waterloo, Wisconsin. In 1856, he delivered speeches in German in support of the Republicans. After running unsuccessfully for Lt. Governor, he moved to Milwaukee and began the practice of law. He was active in the 1860 Presidential campaign with the result that President Lincoln appointed him Minister to Spain. He resigned to enter the Army, where he rose to the rank of Major General and participated in the battles of Second Bull Run, Chancellorsville, Gettysburg and Chattanooga.

After the war, Schurz' life was just as varied and fulfilling. In 1867 he was the editor of a German language newspaper in St. Louis; 1869-75, U.S. Senator from Missouri; 1877; Secretary of the Interior under Hayes, 1881; Editor of the New York Post and President of the Civil Service Reform League. Throughout all of this time, he was actively lecturing and writing, publishing a volume of speeches and a "Life of Henry Clay." He is the author of the oft-cited quotation, "Our country right or wrong" which is almost always given in this shortened form. The full quotation is, "My country right or wrong. When right, to be kept right; when wrong to be put right." He died in 1906 (of exhaustion?) The U.S. Mint struck 150 of these medals in the years 1907 & 8. (H-I)

There is an additional long inscription from the saloon passengers of the Baltic and the Republic to the officers and crews of the Baltic, Republic and the Florida for rescue of 1700 souls.

The story behind this historic medal has been described as follows: "In late January 1909, the White Star liner RMS Republic, known as the 'Millionaires Ship' on account of the wealth of its clientele, set sail for Genoa and Alexandria from New York with a reported 461 passengers and a crew of roughly 300 under the command of Captain Sealby. In dense fog in the early hours 24 January, RMS Republic collided with the steamship Florida off the coast near Martha's Vineyard, which was itself carrying some 800 Italian immigrants heading towards New York from Naples. After a heavy collision, it was clear the Republic was going to sink, Captain Sealby took charge of the abandonment of the ship, and the telegrapher Jack Binns sent out the internationally recognised distress signal via his new Marconi wireless set -'C.Q. - all stations; D. - Distress', colloquially known as 'Come

Quick Danger'. He maintained this signal for 14 hours while the passengers were evacuated onto the *Florida*. Help came before long as other ships came to take the passengers and crew onto their vessels, and the ailing *Republic* was taken in tow by tugs but soon after sank, with rumours of a huge shipment of gold aboard. The ramifications of this incident were huge, in that there had been a swift response and remarkably low loss of life, only 4 seaman and 2 1st class passengers died, with two further wounded. Furthermore, wireless distress signals were made mandatory worldwide, with 'C.Q.D.' eventually being replaced by 'S.O.S.'. "

This was the first ever emergency distress signal using Marconi's recently developed transmitter. The saloon passengers aboard the Baltic & the Republic decided to recognize the bravery of the seaman with a medal which was struck at the order of Ralph Ingersoll, the American watch manufacturer, who was aboard the Baltic. They were awarded unnamed, but many of the recipients had their names inscribed on the edge privately. We have been unable to find reliable mintage figures. It is agreed by all that only 4 medals were struck in gold. There seems to be some agreement that 240 silver medals went to men aboard the Republic. One source states that 97 medals went to the Baltic with an unknown number to the Florida while another source said that the 97 medals went to the Florida and an unknown number to the Baltic. It is estimated that no more than 400 medals were issued overall. (I)



At the International Numismatic Congress in 1910 it was decided that a medal should be issued in honor of Babelon who had acted as President of the Congress. It was struck in 1912 under the joint auspices of the Societe Hollandaise-Belge des Amis de la Medaille d'Art and the American Numismatic Society. According to Miller the usually quoted mintage figures of 100 medals in silver and 200 in bronze relates only to the medals that were struck for the ANS. If one adds in the medals struck for the Societe Hollandaise-Belge, the totals are 156 in silver and 505 in bronze. (G)

Kozar comments, "This medallion is recognized by those who know McKenzie's work as the most beautiful of all he produced." In its original form of 46", it was exhibited at the 1912 Olympic Games in Stockholm and was offered by the American section of the International Olympics Committee to Sweden as a permanent memorial to the fifth Olympiad. After it was accepted, the original plaster was cast into bronze and set into the wall beside the stadium entrance.

In 1914 McKenzie was honored by the King of Sweden when he was presented with a Silver medal in recognition of his work in athletic sculpture. In that same year, the medallion was altered slightly in both the scrolling and the hurdle position. This newer version was signed "R. Tait McKenzie 1914" and it is that version that is offered here. Judging from the patina, we presume that this is a late 20th century strike. (F)

We believe that this version is the original and the one on the medal offered here is a more modern one. (G)

The June, 1918 issue of the American Magazine of Arts reported, "In some of the shop windows on Fifth Avenue, New York, is now to be seen a bronze medal designed and executed by Paul Manship representing the outrages perpetrated by the German army upon women and children in invaded territory, particularly in Belgium. This is offered for sale at \$10.00 a piece and puts into permanent form those things which if possible should not be remembered, but if remembered not visualized. (\$900-1100)

Allen G. Newman, Sc. Edge numbered "4." Struck by Medallic Art Co., but without their edgemark. A nice extremely Fine specimen with fields and edges consistent with the grade. Obverse figure of a woman lightly touching the Liberty Bell. JULY 4, 1776 around the left border. The reverse has the escutcheons of 16 nations around a central inscription, TO COMMEMORATE/THE INTERNATIONAL/CELEBRATION OF/ INDEPENDENCE DAY/ JULY 4, 1918. ANS oak leaf seal.

A mere 39 silver medals were struck as the subscription for the medal was restricted to members of the Society and the members of the Mayor's Committee on National Defense. We last sold a

Roger Hayward (1899-1979) was a talented artist, architect and inventor. Hayward won this award while a student at MIT. He then collaborated extensively with Linus Pauling as illustrator of many of Pauling's books and journal publications. Hayward is also remembered as an expert on the subject of optics who played an important role in the development of the Schmidt-Cassegrain telescope.

The dies for this medal were used by MIT for a number of different awards including The F. W. Chandler Prize and the School Medal Prize, the hand engraved inscription of award being appropriately worded for each. (F)

The animals on both sides have been colored in silver and black by a process which is, as yet unknown <code>Dick Johnson</code> opines that it is not cloisonné enamel. "Particularly because it does not have the fences and is enameled on both sides. If you fired a second side the enamel on the first side would melt and flow off." Such a technology had not been developed at the time this medal was made. Johnson speculates that it could possibly be the white or silver color is some form of plique-a-jour and the black a grisaille."

According to MACO records, they first starting striking this medal in 1924 and did this special version in 1929. Gozo Kawamura (1886-1950), was a Japanese – American sculptor, whose entire medallic output was of cow medals! (G-H)

Coin collectors know his work via both the round and octagonal Pan Pac slugs and the Missouri and San Diego commemorative half dollars. (G-H)

Col. Green was the son of fabled Wall Street investor, Hetty Green, "The Witch of Wall Street." She was notoriously stingy in every aspect of her life. She managed to accumulate a vast fortune and left between \$100 and \$200 million to her son, Edward. "The Colonel" as he was known, was profligate and spent lavishly, Among the most favored objects of his attention was the great whaler, the Charles W. Morgan. Green helped acquire and paid most of the costs of its restoration. He established a park "to create and foster an interest in the history of whaling." Visitors to this historic ship could leave with one of the mementos offered here.

This very piece and its attendant box was the subject of David Schenkman two page article in the January 2015 Numismatist. Why the Numismatist? Col Green, who David Bowers described as "one of the most colorful figures in American numismatics," was immortalized when he acquired at one time, all five of the famous 1913 Liberty Head Nickels." This fascinating little token will be about as close to one of the 1913 nickels as most of us will ever get. Worth \$100+ just for the story!

This Ballanca P200 air bus was built for \$45,000 for the Fidelity Investment Co. of Wheeling. WV. One of these small medals was given to each of the participants in the 1932 Air Races held in Cleveland. Rare – the first we have seen or handled. (F)

According to a GM publication of the time, "The Club was founded in 1933 by a small group of men employed at GM and located at the General Motors Building. This group was spearheaded by Mr. Lou Seaton. These founding fathers crystallized a vision of an organization within the corporation with the following objectives: "The object of this club shall be to sustain a keen interest in the policies and activities of the corporation; to promote friendliness and good will; and to encourage the cultural and professional welfare of its members." This design come in three sizes; 76mm, 35.5mm and 28.2mm. The smallest size is the rarest of the three. We sold a VF example in our 2011 Auction Eighty One for \$632.50.

This is the first example of this uniface medal we have seen. In our 1987 Robert Whitehead Sale, we offered a 8" foundry cast bronze with this very same portrait, but without the name, WILL ROGERS, below. (G)

Alan Stahl has described these as follows: "The two sides of the medal proposed by Jovine depict two stages in the production of a medal or of a coin, the engraving of the die and the striking of the blank. In the presentation of the obverse, the surface of the medal becomes the actual die and the viewer

becomes the engraver, looking down at his own hand raised in high relief carving into the die the oak leaf cluster that is the symbol of the American Numismatic Society. On the reverse, the body of the striker follows the curve of the medal's edge, while one arm of the screw press projects at an oblique angle."

It was this design that was initially selected by the Society Medals Committee for the 125th Anniversary medal. To their great surprise, the design was rejected by the Council on various grounds, none of which were found particularly persuasive by the members of the Medals Committee. Nonetheless, they asked Jovine to submit another design which met the mandates of the Council.

Despite Council's reaction, some members of the Medals Committee were so pleased with the rejected design that 12 sets of uniface casts were ordered from the artist. To our knowledge, this is only the second of that group to reach the auction block. We sold the first in our 2013 83<sup>rd</sup> Sale for \$546.25.

The Silver Dollars sold for \$25.00 each and they sold out by noon the second day of the convention. Some went as a set with a 1991 Half Dollar stamped with the same number. As I recall, I got \$35.00 for the sets." A similar piece numbered "53" brought \$164.45 in our last sale. (Lot 904).

The "Shield of Athletes" is one of MacKenzie's most well-known and admired works. In the form of a 60" colored plaster it won him the third prize medal in the International Olympic competition of art as related to sport in 1932. Medallic Art Co. later acquired the rights to the art and over the years has used it on a variety of small medals. To our knowledge, this 9 1/2" casting is the largest bronze reproduction of the original 5 foot plaster. The beauty and importance of this work becomes apparent at once when viewed in this large size.

MacKenzie comments: "The great shield or buckler...shows the apotheosis of athletic sports on the track and field.... The central medallion shows the spirit of Olympia helmeted (sic), sandalled, and garbed in archaic Greek drapery. She brings together two modern athletes who shake hands in the token of the spirit of In which they will compete. Beneath their feet are the words, "Pax Olympica." This medallion is

surrounded by a wreath of laurel and a border which divided it from a series of irregular shaped panels representing the field events. Beginning at the lower left hand side they show (1) The hammer throw....(2) The second panel directly above this shows three javelin throwers...(3) The third panel of the series shows a pole vaulter...(4) The fourth panel on the right of the central figure shows the high jumper....Below and to the right are four shot-putters....Beneath this panel a sixth (panel) shows three men practicing the discus throw....Beneath is a long panel with eight hurdlers."

"An interrupted border separates these panels from the outer frieze of runners. Small square plaques divide it at the four corners each containing one figure, the upper two showing a broad jumper... a high jumper... while the lower plaques show one athlete tying his shoe and another lifting the fifty-six pound weight. Presiding over these panels is a winged figure of "Aviation" or flight, with outstretched wings..... The outer panel or frieze is occupied by a procession of runners showing the race from start to finish."

The Harrison Dillard award plaque is awarded annually to the outstanding male athlete in the sprints and hurdles category. Dillard was a Hall of Fame sprinter/hurdler and double 100m/4x100m gold medalist from the 1948 London Olympics who was also the world record holder in the 110m hurdles at the time. The Dillard Award has been presented annually since 1983. □Kevin Young became the first and only man in history to shatter the 47-second barrier by winning the 1992 Olympic men's 400m hurdles gold medal in the astounding world record time of 46.78 seconds. □ (\$1500+)



The Association served as social one to foster camaraderie among former volunteer firemen after the paid fire department came to Paterson in 1890. The association had a building with a parlor, smoking and sitting room, kitchen and dining room, games room, bath room, and reading room." (E-F)

For those collectors who do not wish to spend the \$1500+ for an original Low 57, this token is an acceptable substitute (at lest for the obverse). (D-E)

This enigmatic token was cataloged in an 1878 Cogan sale as being issued by the French Masons. In a note in the October 1878 AJN, Masonic scholar, William T., Marvin, unequivocally stated that "...there is nothing whatever Masonic about it, neither is it a French medal. It is the signet of a 'Select Templar' the highest degree in an American secret society, the 'Templars of Honor and Temperance.' Instituted about 1845." (E)

The "Spades Are Trumps" legend on this stickpin has always been considered enigmatic. However, with the aid of Google, we found the following in the September 4, 1862 edition of The New York Herald "Much severe and misplaced criticism has been expended upon General McClellan for his repeated use of the spade and shovel. It now, however, turns out, by events just happening, that spades are trumps. What would at this moment be very probably the fate of Washington city if the liberal use of the spade had not, at the proper time, thrown up those splendid entrenchments which now no sudden inroad of an enemy can surmount? But for the use of the spade in this instance Washington would be an open plain, exposed on all sides to any sudden raid. A further illustration of the value of this humble instrument is now presented to us in the case of Cincinnati, where they are said to be at this moment busily engaged throwing up entrenchments to meet the rebels, should they venture to come to the Ohio. We therefore say vive la spade, and only hope that the rebels will go into Ohio; for most assuredly if they do not one of them will come back alive. The spade, the rifle

and the bayonet are important articles of warfare." (C-D)

This token has always had a special meaning for me. In my sophomore year at Lehigh University, I was President of the Young Democrats and a Regional Coordinator for Students for Kennedy & Johnson. My primary job was to speak before Protestant Church groups on the subject of why a Protestant should have no compunctions about voting for a Catholic for President. Now, 55 years later - with five Catholics and four Jews currently sitting on the Supreme Court and an African American President – I'd say we have come a long way! (C)

This medal was struck and signed by S. Johnson, Italy and appears in gold (20mm, 30mm & 45mm) and in silver (45mm.) There is no mention of any "JANUARY 1961" reverse.

Mayhew (p.159) pictures this variation and catalogs a 60mm example in "cast Silver" (I8-H) but his pictures and discussion are disjointed and confusing without any attempt to address the probability/ possibility that the two varieties were struck several years apart. William Rice's "The Kennedy World in Medallic Art" is of no help in that it does not distinguish between the two reverses. Out gut instinct is that the "January 1961" medal was struck as an inaugural commemorative and that the reverse die was altered





after the assassination to make a memorial medal. (C-D)

sales outstripping their Signers of the Declaration of Independence and Statehood series, also done by Menconi. It is probably about time that someone did a catalogue raisonné on Menconi's medallic work. In our view he is an underappreciated artist with an unerring eye for realistic portraiture. (F)

In the process, he has enriched our political and medallic heritage. 1,340 medals were struck in bronze and a 49 in Nickel Silver. (D)



The 70mm Official Ford bronze medal has been encased in a 5 x 8" envelope. In addition, a red and white WIN (Whip Inflation Now) button has also been inserted into the envelope. A 10¢ Rural America stamp has been cancelled with what purports to be an Aug 9 1974 Washington, D.C. cancellation. Issued by the "99 Company" of San Clemente, CA.

The descriptive folder describes this is a "Commemorative PNC marking inauguration of Gerald R. Ford as 38th President of the United States on August 9, 1974. It erroneously described the medal as the "official issue in the U.S. Mint Presidential Series, Produced by the Medallic Art Company." The authenticity of the cancellation mark is questionable since the medal and the WIN button were not made until well after the August 9, 1974 cancellation date. However, it is possible that the plain envelopes, sans medal and button, were cancelled and held for later processing. In any event, this is the first of these covers that we have seen. (E)

was submitted in the competition for the official medal but was rejected by the Medals Committee or others empowered to select the official medal. (E)

# MEDALS FROM THE SOCIETY OF MEDALISTS

Since 1930, when it was founded, until 1995, the Society of Medalists has issued two medals per year to its members. The list of sculptors contributing to the series reads like a Who's Who of the American sculptors' community. The series contains some of the finest art medals ever produced in this country. Of course, each medal was struck by the Medallic Art Company, the premier producers of American medallic art.

This series (along with the Circle of the Friends of the Medallion) has been meticulously cataloged by David Alexander is his book, *American Art Medals*, 1909-1995.

Struck in the middle of the Prohibition era, this medal did not go unnoticed. According the Harry Rand, "The Society of Medalists second issue produced an uproar, caused by the gentlest tempest in an otherwise occupied teacup. Manship's 1930 salute to Bacchus presented the god of wine and debauchery rather too attractively for some of its viewers. Protests were received from members of the Society of Medalists and one member threatened to resign if 'any more insults to the Constitution are perpetrated in the name of art'." Manship stated, "So, on the reverse of the medal, two satyrs are treading the winepress. Their stupid faces, pointed ears, goat legs and tails, betray the dominance of animal instincts which their master Dionysus exemplifies. The medal is not conventional. It is subtly humorous, and is symbolic of a present-day attitude toward certain restraints of the times. Thus it is commemorative of an era." (G)

In 1973, the Society of Medalists decided to strike all new issues in .999 silver as well as bronze. The first 40 issues were also struck in silver and offered anew to Society members. The edition limit was set at 700. This new marketing venture was not as successful as anticipated with the result that silver strikings were discontinued in 1980. The actual number of silver specimens struck for individual medals varied from 25 to 250. Only 50 of the Dionysus medals were struck in silver. We last sold one of these in our 2011 81st Auction for \$1035.00.

This is the 28th issue of the Society of Medalists originally issued in 1943. This medal was originally struck in a 36mm size in silver, a departure from the usual bronze because of the wartime shortage of that metal. In 1973, where the Society decided to strike a number of their medals in silver (instead of the usual bronze), they also decided to issue bronze medals for the two wartime silver emissions. Issue #28 was thus struck in bronze in 36mm (mintage of 35) and in 73mm (mintage of 100). The bronze examples of these two issues are, by far, the rarest in the series and are in great demand. We have auction records as high as \$440.00

# STATUE OF LIBERTY TOKENS AND MEDALS

Offered here is a nice selection of duplicates from the collection of Paul Lajoie. Reference is made to John J. Gabriel's 1983 work, "Exonumia of Liberty Enlightening the World." Paul has been the pre-eminent collector of Statue of Liberty material for many years. In anticipation of revising the Gabriel reference, he purchased the copyright from the Gabriel Estate and is now hard at work on a new and expanded edition.

Dick Johnson states that this medal was struck by the Paris Mint from original metal taken from Bartholdi's studio. Abler quotes Alan Herbert in the 9/30/09 Numismatic News, as saying: "Our source indicates there was such a medal, described as 50mm in diameter, with the statue and the words, "Commemorative Monument of American Independence" on the obverse. On the reverse: "In remembrance of the old friendship between the United States and France by public subscription amongst the citizens of booth [sic.] nations 1776-1876." The incorrect spelling of "both" reportedly led

to the withholding of the medal, which was never issued publicly." (F)

# A SELECTION OF BOY SCOUT/ LIBERTY LOAN CAMPAIGN MEDALS, 1917-1919

During this period the scouting community was enlisted by the Treasury Dept. to sell Liberty Bonds. It was a grand success! Going door to door, the boy scouts secured over 2.3 million subscriptions and brought over \$355 million to the US Treasury. In order to reward the scouts for their hard work, the Treasury presented War Service Medals to every scout who obtained ten subscriptions.

A total of 75,240 War Service Medals were awarded between June 1917 and May 1919, with almost 11,000 pin attachments, The pin bar was given to a scout who earned a second award, and a bar with 4 links was added for a third and fourth award. Each bar was imprinted on the reverse to identify the specific campaign for which it was earned.

# **MEDICAL MEDALS**

Offered here is one of the largest collections of medical medals to reach the auction block in recent memory. The vast majority of these medals is unlisted by Storer or Freeman since they were struck long after either book was published. Each medal is described in detail with some explanatory text where warranted.

Many of these lots consist of award medals which have not been bestowed. While award medals are more desirable when they have been named to a recipient, the collector should be aware that by their nature, such medals seldom appear in the marketplace. Awarded examples are often kept by the family and unawarded examples are not usually made in any kind of quantity. To give some idea of their scarcity, the vast majority of the medals offered here have never before been seen by me in my 46 years of cataloging exonumia!

histology and descriptive anatomy. Despite working without a microscope, he was the first to introduce the notion of tissues as distinct entities, and maintained that diseases attacked tissues rather than whole organs or the entire body, causing a revolution in anatomical pathology. (D)

There were four in number and were sold only as a set. The advertised titles were: Physician as Healer; Physician as Researcher; Physician as Technologist and Physician as Teacher. The consignor of this collection, however, takes issue with this and contends that the four plaques represent four of the branches of the medical art; Internal Medicine, Orthopedics, Surgery and Pharmacy.

He states, "I grant your text which, incidentally, corresponds to that of the brochure issued with the medals by the Medical Heritage Society. However, trust me, the medal you have represents Surgery, and the others are also branches of the medical art and are not as described in the article or brochure. Horn may well have told someone that he intended to represent teaching etc, but in the event he made undeniable specialty-specific depictions each of which may have aspects of the "teacher", "healer" etc. That brochure hacks, newspaper reporters and others, none of who would know a practitioner of Medicine from a Martian, later stuck with the original prospectus idea rather than the manifest actuality need come as no surprise to a veteran cataloger, and a peruser of secondary sources that often perpetuate falsities one after the other."
